In Bentinck the total vote polled for local option is given by the Post as 377 and against local option 234. It says the majority for the by-law is

The correct majority is easily arrived at. If two vote against the by-law, "Shall our boys and girls remain three must vote for it, so as to keep even. This means that half as many wore must vote for as against. 234 voted against it. To the 234 add half of 234, or 117, and we get 351. Now if 351 voted for the by-law, the required 60 per cent of the whole vote would have been polled in its favor. Any-thing over 351 would be the majority in accordance with the legal requirements. Take 351 from 377, the total vote polled for the by-law, and we get a majority of 26, which is the actual majority.

The way the Post figured out the result was by finding the total vote polled on the by-law, which is 611. Sixty per cent of this is 366 3/5. Take this from 377 and we get 102/5 not 103, as given in the Post, which was likely a typographical error. It the Post or Shelburne Economist have any doubt in the matter let them subtract any ceive subscriptions at clubbing number up to 25 from the total vote rates for many of the city papers, polled for the by-law, and 60 per cent of the total vote polled for and against will still show the by-law carried.

The only way the majority can be figured out as less than 26 is by counting each favorable voter, over the 351 as two thirds of a man. The Shelburne Economist had a lengthy article on the majority question last week, but the Economist was wrong, and if he figures it out according to the method outlined he will find the majority greater than is given. If Bentinck had given only 352 votes they would have a majority and the by law would have been carried just the same, provided the number against it remained unchanged at 234.
