Egremont Council.

Council met January 10th. Members elected subscribed to the required declarations and entered upon their duties as follows:—John McArthur, Reeve, J. R. Philp, Wm. Watson, Jno. D. Roberts and Jas. McIvride councillors.

The Reeve addressed the council—Minutes read adopted—

By-law 239 to appoint auditors received its readings. The name of Jas. F. Durrant and Wm. Ramage were inserted in By-law as auditors, salary \$10.00 each. By-law was signed. By-law 240 to appoint a member of the Board of Health and a medical H. Officer was passed. The name of John Scott as health officer and that of Dr. Sneath as M. H. O. were inserted in By-law. The members of the Board of Health for 1910 are:—Jno. Scott for 3 years, R. T. Dodds for 2 years and D. McQueen for 1 year, together with the Reeve and Clerk and Dr. Sneath as Medical Health Officer.

McIvride—Philp—That a grant of \$5.00 be made to the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto.—Carried.

Roberts—Philp—That Mr. McIvride examine the Registry office re Treas. salaries and report at next meeting.—Carried.

Watson—Roberts—That John Ross be paid \$3.00 for 3 days S. labor being 3 days in excess of assessment.—Carried.

Dr. Brown presented a detailed statement amounting to \$32.55 in connection with O. Cartier being a deficit of \$7.55.

Roberts—Watson—That an order be granted to Dr. Brown for \$7.55 to pay said deficit.—Carried.

Philp—McIvride—That Dr. Brown's request for \$20.00 for medicine for O. Cartier be laid over till next meeting.—Carried.

McIvride—Roberts—That \$1.00 be refunded to S. Sect. No. 6 error in taxes on lot 10-11 con. 7 for 1908.—Carried.

Philp—Watson—Whereas a Board of School Trustees requested the council to appoint a Trust Officer for the township to which the council agreed provided the fees of said Officer can be made chargeable to the section requiring his services—The Clerk is hereby authorized to refer the matter to the Minister of Education.—Carried.

The sum of \$5 33 was paid into council by Treas. of S. S. No. 4 being their share of expenses in locating boundary line of S. S.

Roberts—McIvride—That R. Hunter be paid \$7.00 for travelling on 8th and P. Townline recommended by W. Watson.—Carried.

Watson—Philp—That \$5.75 be paid to Hunter estate com. fees for work done by the late D. Hunter, certified to by Mr. Watson.—Carried.

Philp—Roberts—That the following be the road Comrs. and divisions for 1910:—Division 1, Comr. Watson, cons. 4, 6, 8, inclusive with sidelines from Proton town line inclusive W. to O. S. R. and from Gardiner's sideline to Mt. Forest. Division 2, Comr. Roberts cons. 10, 12, 14, 16 inclusive with sidelines to con. 18 from 10th sideline not inclusive W. to O. S. R. and from Gardiner's sideline N. to Bradley's sideline not inclusive, and sidelines to con. 8. Division 3, Comr. Philp cons. 10, 12, 14 and 16, inclusive, with sidelines to con. 18 not inclusive and S. to con. 8 and Proton townline. Division 4, Comr. McIvride cons. 18 inclusive 20, 22, inclusive O. S. R. Glenelg and Proton townlines from con. 18 with sideline.—Carried.

Resolved that the following accounts be paid:—Each Dep. R. O. \$8.50; Clerk delivering ballots \$4.00; subscriptions to Munl World \$5.00; W. J. Sharp use of Hall, Nomination, \$3.00; Treas. bank exchange on Co. grant \$1.50; R. Canton filling washout \$1.00.

Philp—Roberts—Adjourn to meet on Feb. 7th to receive auditors' report, for collectors and assessor, tenders for tile making, appt of Pathmasters etc.

The members elect met in the township hall, Ayton, as per statute, at 11 a.m., Monday January 10th. The clerk administered the oath of property qualification, also the declaration of office to each member namely: Reeve, A. Schenk. Dep.-reeve, W. Umbach. Councillors, R.J. Shiel, C. Baetz and W. Kenna.

After the council was organized the reeve addressed the members at some length, using as his password, Economy, for the year 1910.

The council adjourned to meet in the clerk's office at 2 p.m.

Shiel—Kenna.—That Mr. W. H. Ryan be re-appointed member of the Board of Health for 3 years, and that Dr. J.L. Easton be appointed D.D. Health Officer for the year 1910, and that By-law No. 2, of 1910 be given its proper reading, which was done.—Carried.

Kenna—Baetz.—That By-law No. 3 of 1910 to appoint or re-appoint township officers and set salaries for the year 1910 be given its proper readings. Clerk R.H. Fortune—salary \$200; Treasurer Jas. H. Ellis, \$100.

Shiel—Kenna.—That the Ayton Advance office be given the township printing at the same price of contract as last year, viz. \$5.—Carried.

Umbach—Baetz.—That a grant of \$5 be given the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto.—Carried.

Shiel—Kenna.—That Mrs. Walsh be appointed caretaker of township hall, at a salary of \$10, payable in advance, 1-2 yearly.—Carried.

Shiel—Umbach.—That the salary of the assessor be \$5, and that the clerk advertise for applications to be received up to 10 a.m., Monday, Feb. 7th, also for three collectors.—Carried.

Umbach—Shiel.—That John Salm be re-appointed sanitary inspector at a salary of \$5.—Carried.

The Commissioners were appointed for the following Divisions: No. 1, Baetz; No. 2, Kenna; No. 3, Shiel; No. 4, Umbach.

The Bridge Committee consists of the reeve and deputy-reeve, together with the commissioner in the division where bridges are situated.

Luedke, \$4.95; V. Fischer, repairing road and pay for tile, lot 1, con. 17, \$2.10 Hospital for Sick Children, \$5.00; Mrs. Walsh, 1-2 yrs salary as caretaker of twp hall, 1910 \$5.00; A. EDITORIALS TO THE GREEN GROVE EYE OPENER EXTRAVAGANCE

Only a word of twelve letters, yet what a meaning it carries with it. It's definition is lavish expense, or waste; and a large number of people are more or less inclined to be extravagant. It has often been the means, directly or indirectly, of putting people out of business. Many have been plunged into the abyss of debt because of extravagance. High living, gay and expensive clothing as also money spent on foolish or unnecessary articles, or things which we can do without. These things go hand in hand with extravagance.
