EDITORIALS TO THE GREEN GROVE EYE-OPENER

ROBERT BURNS.

A long time ago, in a clay cottage, near the bridge of Doon, in Ayrshire County, Scotland, on the 25th of January, 1759, just one hundred and fifty-one years ago to-day, was born a babe whose name was Robert Burns.

Burns' father was a very poor man, and for the first seven years of this boy's life, he worked as gardener for a rich gentleman. At the age of seven, Bobbie was a sturdy, stubborn boy, not much of a favorite with anyone.

As his father could not afford to send his boy to school, he decided to rent a farm and teach him to work. He was soon able to plough and became a great help to his father. He was very fond of reading, and read all the books he could get.

At the age of sixteen he took a great notion to write poetry, but thought he was at a great disadvantage because he was so poor and unlearned.

The following year he attended a dancing school, against his father's wishes. For this, his father took a dislike to him, which Burns believed was one cause of the bad habits he afterwards contracted.

When he was nineteen years of age he spent a season at a noted school a good distance from home, to learn mensuration, surveying and dialling. He got along very well with his studies, but he associated with bad companions and became a victim to drunkenness at the early age of nineteen. He then gave up his school and returned to his home.

His life went on much in the same way till his twenty-third year, when he went in company with a flax dresser to learn his trade. This was a very unfortunate step for Burns. They were giving a welcome carousal to the New Year, when the shop caught fire and was burnt to ashes, and Burns was left penniless, and to make matters worse, he was disappointed in some love affair with Jean Armour. These two combined caused Burns to be very melancholy for some time.

About this time, his father died, and he and his brother took a farm, making full resolutions to become farmers and support their mother and family. But the first year they got poor seed, and the harvest was late, the result being that they lost half their crops. On account of this misfortune, they got discouraged.

Burns now began to be known as a maker of rhymes, his first poem being "The Holy Fair." Burns was a poet. It was no trouble for him to compose a poem. Once when he was ploughing, the ploughshare turned out a mouse's nest, and the mouse ran out. He was very sorry, and then and there composed the poem entitled "To a Mouse."

Burns then gave up his share in the farm to his brother, and prepared to go to Jamaica, but decided to publish his poems first. He sent out six hundred copies, bringing him a sum of nearly twenty pounds, which was very acceptable at this time.

He had been in Jamaica a few days, going from covert to covert always, in fear of getting into a jail. But one day a friend of his received a letter from Mr. Blacklock. He was so pleased with Burns' poems that he wanted a second edition in Edinburgh. Burns immediately made for that city and was placed under the protection of a very noble man, the Earl of Glencairn.

Here he met with a modest, gentle girl, whose name was Mary, with whom he fell in love. She had promised to marry him, but her parents were not willing. Mary went home to her parents and was the all summer, and in the fall she and her brother were going to Glasgow to work during the winter, and on that way, Mary was going to bid Burns farewell before he went back to Jamaica. But before they got to Burns, her brother took the fever. Mary nursed him tenderly till he was well, but she unfortunately took the fever and died in a few days. Burns mourned her loss very much and afterwards wrote the beautiful poem "To Mary in Heaven."

After receiving five hundred pounds for the Edinburgh edition of his poems, he returned to the home of his childhood, and was soon able to take a farm of his own, and also to lend one hundred and eighty pounds to his brother, to help support his mother.

He wrote a prodigious amount of poetry, mostly short poems. He did not need to study or think deeply in order to write poetry, but any little incident or thought that was suggested to his mind seemed to cause the words to flow out with very little mental effort on his part. The poem "To a Mouse" was composed while he was ploughing. Once, while in church, he was seated behind a very stylishly dressed lady, who wore a very big hat. Burns noticed a louse on this lady's hat. He immediately took out a paper and pencil and wrote that well known poem "To a Louse." Some of his poems were full of tenderness and pathos. What could be more tender than his song, "Afton Water," or what more pathetic than his poem "To Mary in Heaven?" His poem "A Man's a Man for a' That" is full of simple, common sense.

His breast was full of love for Scotland, and he gave expression to his patriotism in the famous poem "Scots Wha Hae We' Wallace Bled."

In the latter end of April, 1788, Burns married Jean Armour, and

took her to his new home. But misfortune again followed the poet's steps. The farm proved a ruinous speculation and he was finally compelled to give it up, and move into the town of Dumfries, where he remained till his death supporting his family on fifty pounds a year.

In January 1796, Burns spent an evening in the hotel, and on his return home overcome by liquor, he sank down on the doorstep in the snow and slept there for some hours. When he awoke, his thoughts were turned to his beloved Mary, and as it was ten years ago this morning since she died he then composed this poem:

Thou lingering star, with lessening ray,
That lovest to greet the early morn,
Again thou usherest in the day
My Mary from my soul was torn.
Oh Mary! dear departed shade!
Where is thy place of blissful rest,
See'st thou thy lover lowly laid,
Hear'st thou the groans that rend his breast?

As a result of this exposure, Burns got a severe cold, and everything was done to restore health, but all in vain, and on July 21st, the great Scottish poet died, largely from the cause of liquor, at the age of 37, just in the prime of life, a tragedy which extinguished what would likely have proved to be the greatest poetical genius of all times.

He was buried with military honors by the gentlemen volunteers of Dumfries.
