Board of Health met January 22. Moved by R. T. Dodds, seconded by D. Allan, that J. McArthur, reeve, be chairman.—Carried.
Allan - Dodds.—That respecting the unsettled accounts relating to smallpox cases, which have been rendered by the clerk, they remain in abeyance, and should any new cases arise, these shall be dealt with in strict accordance with the by-law relating to smallpox cases, passed in open session of the Board of Health, on the fourteenth day of August, 1909.—Car.
Copies of the said by-law, together with notices to be filled up by the school teachers, and to be mailed to Dr. Sneath, M.H.O., Dromore, relating to contagious diseases have been mailed to each teacher in the township and copies relating to smallpox have been forwarded also to each member of the Board of Health for their guidance should an outbreak occur.
Dodds—Allan.—That the following be the districts over which the members of the Board of Health have supervision, and to see that the several provisions of the said by-law are fully carried out.

No. 4, con. 16, 18, 20, 22, from B.L. to 10th S.L.; Clerk, Div. No. 5, con. 1, 2, 3, from Glenje to Mt. Forest.—Carried.

\$40 and Costs

Before police magistrate Wm. H. Ryan, at Ayton on Wednesday of last week, Martin Bolger, of Conn. Proton township, pleaded guilty to a charge of keeping liquor for sale. It was called a second offence and a fine of \$40 and costs was imposed. For a similar offence last summer the same magistrate had imposed a fine of \$100 and costs. But this time a fine of \$100 and costs was also imposed for obstructing provincial license inspector Ayerst and two constables while searching the premises for liquor. A bottle of whisky had been taken down by another person and its contents thrown on the floor. The department is determined to prosecute such offenders to the fullest extent of the law in order to suppress this kind of interference with license inspectors while searching for liquor.—Mt.
