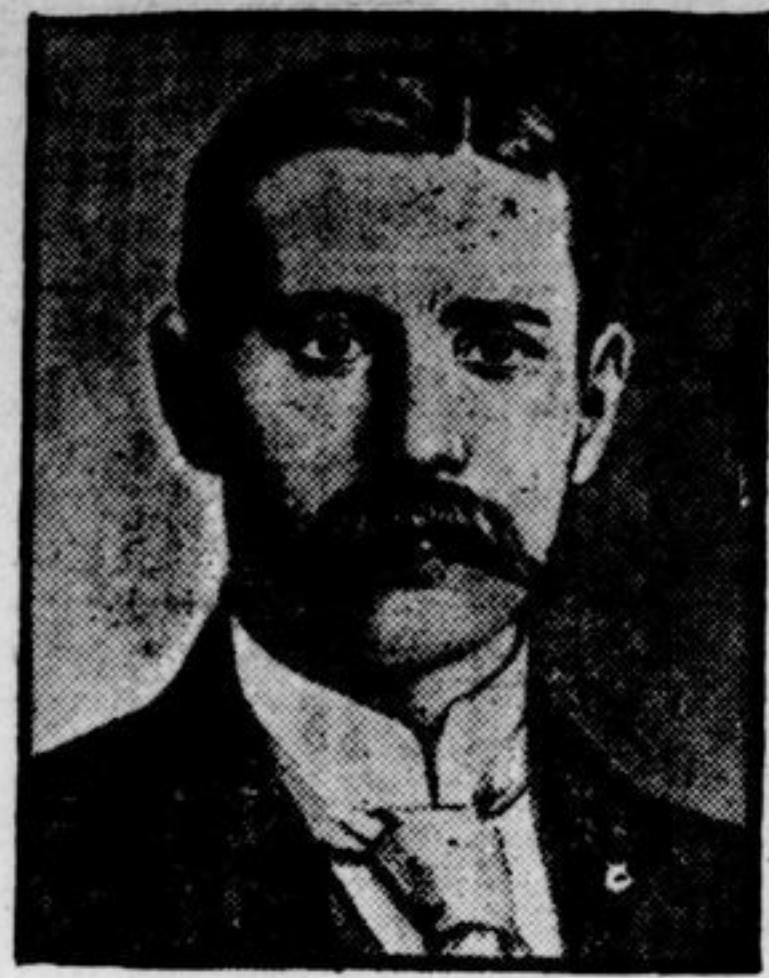
Miss Emma Moffat of Narva, is visiting at her uncle's Mr. Wm. Ritchie's and other relatives.
