FANNY CROSBY.

Ninety years ago, March 25th, there was born in Putnam County, New York State, Fanny Jane Crosby who is known the world over as the writer of the best known hymns, such as "Pass me not, O gentle Saviour," "Jesus keep me near the Cross," "To the Work," "Blessed Assurance," "All the way my Saviour leads me," "I am thine, O Lord," "Rescue me Perishing," "We shall know each other there," "Just a word for Jesus," "Saved by Grace," and "Safe in the arms of Jesus." The mere enumeration of these titles, will, to those familiar with hymns at all, sufficiently indicate the important place the authoress has filled in the modern Christian world.

Yet Fanny Crosby has been blind from infancy. When a few weeks old a physician treated her wrongly for inflammation of the eyes with disastrous results to her sight. Yet she had not a word of blame for that physician. Very early she accepted her lot with the utmost cheerfulness. The first verses she composed at the age of eight were the following:

"Oh what a happy child I am,
Although I cannot see!
I am resolved that in the world,
Contented I will be,
How many blessings I enjoy,
That other people don't,
So weep or sigh because I'm blind
I cannot, nor I won't."

Instead of complaining, she accepted her blindness as an opportunity to do work from which she would have been hindered by the distractions that would have been presented to her through vision. At fifteen she entered the New York school for the blind, and made such progress that in ten years she became one of the instructors. In 1858 she married Alexander VanAlstyne, one of the teachers in the same institution, who died in 1862. It was not till 1864 she began her life work, the writing of hymns. She has written over a thousand of these. She is well and in possession of her powers and wishes to write more. Many of her hymns have been written in a few minutes, "in response to a sudden call under an inspiration that would not be denied," others have been slow and laborious in composition.

NOTES FOR HOG RAISERS.

Let the sows run out until a few days before farrowing.

Where two sows have small litters, one sow may rear both.

It is easily possible to make the slop too rich for young pigs.

At least until settled weather in the spring, the pigs should have bedding.

A good growth, and development of bone is essential in a hog kept for breeding.

Brood sows that are expected to farrow soon should have warm, dry quarters.

One advantage in a flat-bottomed trough is that it enables each pig to secure a better share of the feed.

As a machine for converting farm products into meat, and thus into money, the hog stands at the head of all farm animals. Air-slaked lime is a cheap, good disinfectant, and can often be used to a good advantage by sprinkling over the sleeping quarters.

It is a good plan to have some warm, thin slop ready to give a sow as soon as she is through farrowing and shows an inclination to get up.

When necessary to discard old sows, select the young ones from

dams that have proved themselves good animals.

Do not be hasty in shifting from one kind of stock to another. The man who sticks to hogs, sheep or cattle through thick and thin, will generally get out all right.

With the sows that farrow early, care must be taken to keep the pigs warm. It is comparatively easy to stunt the early pigs, and once stunted, they never fully recover from the effects.

Pigs that have been wintered over should have their growth pushed as rapidly as possible now in order to fatten before hot weather sets in. It rarely pays to attempt to fatten hogs in summer.

One of the best plans of management, when it can be done, is to give the pigs the run of the orchard during the growing season, and especially so if the orchard is well seeded to clover.

AFTER A CARNEGIE LIBRARY

A committee from the town council met a committee from the public library on Friday night last to discuss the question of applying to Mr Andrew Carnegie, who is evidently trying hard to dispose of his fast accumulating wealth by making grants to libraries, and in other directions. On Saturday night the question was again taken up at a special meeting of the town council, when it was decided to ask for a grant of \$15,000, the town to supplement this by an additional \$5000, and to furnish annual maintenance. The matter is only in its infancy, and it may be somewhat premature to say anything about the intentions of the council in case the donation is received. We believe, however, that the erection of a Carnegie Library and Hall, is floating round the imaginations of the town fathers.

For those who find maple syrup beyond their means, try this: Five cups of light brown sugar, three to four cups granulated sugar, and about one-quarter to one-half pound maple sugar; add water, and boil to consistency of syrup.

To make delicious butterscotch two cupfuls of granulated sugar, half cup water, half cup vinegar, one pound butter. Stir constantly while cooking, and cook until it forms a hard ball in cold water. Pour in greased tins, and when nearly cold, mark in squares.
