Yet Fanny Crosby has been blind from infancy. When a few weeks old. a physician treated her wrongly for inflammation of the eyes with disastrous results to her sight. Yet she had not a word of blame for that physician. Very early she accepted her lot with the utmost cheerfulness.' The first verses she composed at the age of eight were the following:

"Oh what a happy child I am, Although I cannot see! I am resolved that in the world,

That other people don't, So weep or sigh because I'm blind
