### ALLIE LITTLEJOHNS DEAD.

Markdale Standard.  
Seldom has the Standard been called upon to perform a more painful duty than devolves upon us this week to record the death of an exemplary young man and valued member of the Standard staff in the person of Allie G. Littlejohns, aged 23 years, 10 months. Allie was at his post as Monoline operator until Saturday evening, April 9th, and also in his accustomed place in the Methodist church choir, Sunday evening the 10th. After taking a special part in the singing of an anthem, his solo part being "I heard the voice of Jesus say, 'Come unto me and rest,'" he was obliged to withdraw. The following day medical aid was called in, and before the week end, the three local physicians were with him, as also a trained nurse, but all to no avail, as each day the case grew more critical, and on the following Sunday, at 11.15 he passed away. The fatal trouble proved to be that of degeneration of the blood, which led to hemorrhage of the bowels, the kidneys, and other parts. The premature ending of such a promising young life, has cast a pall of sadness over the whole community, and even men of stout heart and mature years, were moved to tears as they viewed the remains. Burial took place on Tuesday under the auspices of Saugeen Lodge, Independent Order of Oddfellows, of which he had been an esteemed member. A most touching and appropriate service was held in the Methodist church, the pastor, Rev. Joseph Young, officiating, the choir also co-operating, and the I. O. O. F., which was largely represented, taking part. Mr. J. H. Dundas sang very impressively the solo entitled "Beyond the smiling and the weeping." Miss Leonie Matthews presiding at the organ. The large concourse which assembled at the church was a glowing tribute to the high respect and esteem in which deceased was held by the citizens. At the conclusion of this service, the body was laid away in the family plot, Markdale public cemetery. The floral offerings were beautiful among which was a Pillow, from the family; "the Gates Ajar," from the choir and League; "The Broken Column," with motto "Fidelity," from the Standard; wreath from the Baseball Club; wreath from Jas. Dillon and Harry Harness; and others. The pall bearers were Dr. Durkin, Carman King, Laurie Munshaw, R. J. Gillfillan, Thos. Davis, and J. W. Tucker.

Allie commenced as an apprentice in the Standard office the 3rd October, 1900, and with the exception of about four months which he spent as manager of the Chatsworth News a year ago, had been on our staff continuously. He proved himself a superior mechanic, industrious, loyal, genial, companionable and most trustworthy. He was a young man of life, abstemious habits, and admirable qualities of head and heart. He was for some years a valued member of the Methodist church choir and also an active member and officer of the Epworth League. In sports—hockey, tennis, baseball, lacrosse, he was an enthusiast, always playing a good clean, honorable game, and was a favorite with all his associates. He leaves to mourn his premature death, father, mother, one brother, and three sisters, who have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of acquaintances.

Mr. Littlejohns was well known in Durham, where he has played lacrosse and baseball on several occasions.—Ed.


