Priceville

The woods are indicating that we have now the merry month of May which makes fields and forests look gay. How pleasant to listen to the sweet notes in the morning while the birds are singing their morning hymn of praise at the dawn of day, rejoicing, as it were, that they are again privileged to see the return of the beautiful summer. After being exposed to the dreary elements of winter during the past months, how pleasant it seems to those whose daily avocations requires them to be indoors when they get out in the evenings and behold the beauties of nature as they ramble through the fields and lanes admiring the flowers as they cast forth their sweet-scented odors while it is to those of us who are plodding from sunrise to sunset, a pleasure to get home to enjoy the sweet comforts of rest after being trudging after a pair of young horses all day, performing that noble calling which the world at large is depending on, "farming." The farmer is looked upon by those who know no better, as a man who is always up to his ears in dust and mud, and is sometimes called "mossback," or "elchopper," or "hayseed," or something else, but where do the millions of people who are fed all over the universe get their food but from the products of the farmer, who under difficult circumstances sometimes had to contend with scanty means while performing his duties in the early part of his career as a farmer. For instance, we heard an Englishman talking at a logging bee in the township of Proton fifty years ago, the meal at dinner time was potatoe and sweet milk, partly admitted by the flavor of leeks. These were hard times for an Englishman who is generally used to something more substantial. As for an Irishman or a Scotchman, if they got praties and butter-milk, it wasn't so bad, and the other oatmeal porridge. They all thought it was fine food in the land of their birth, on the other side of the fish pond. Take the general fare nowadays at meal times, and there is a vast contrast between now and long ago. Nowadays the fatted calf will be killed if there is no other kind of meat for our bees. As for logging bees, there are none now, in this part, but we have wood bees, threshing bees, and such like, and we find that the cooks are striving which of them prepares the grandest meal, which, in general, would do credit to a wedding party.

As we are accused of making reference to that noble animal, the ox, or old "Buck and Bright," we again go back to his day of usefulness, when doing his hard day's labor at a logging bee. In the early days, his rations would not be hay and oats at dinner time, but turned out behind the slash fence and make his noon meal of cow cabbage, which was then plentiful in the woods, while the poor men that were rolling the logs together had to feed on something not very substantial, but then the people of yore olden days were made of better material than the young men of to-day. But we don't want to insult the young people of the present age, for they are a fine lot of young men, and if they were living in the days of old, we take it for granted that they would be as hardy as their forefathers were.

We heard an aged lady tell of the old-time manner of putting in the crop in part of Glenelg, when oxen weren't to be had, and horses were out of the question. The land was logged and cleared, (a few acres) and then the wheat was sown and the members of the family all turned out with hoes and picked the ground up nicely, covering the seed better than a disc harrow will to-day, and then the ground was run over with a home-made rake, so as to make it smooth on top, and the yield would be good at harvest time. How would this manner of seeding suit in the spring of 1910? Would all the women, boys and girls, turn out with their old hoes to put in the crop? No! They would starve before they would think of the like, but now we must pass on to something else.

This is the second day of May, and the second day of April looked more like May than this morning. Seeding was kept back the latter part of the past week on account of the late spell of wet weather. Gaelic communion in the Presbyterian church, last Sunday was fairly well attended. The text was from Ps. 119, the 103rd verse, and here it is in Gaelic: "Cia milis blasda do briadra, N's milse no cirr mhealla do mo Cheill," so the readers will look it up for themselves.
