One Day Was Sufficient

Rev. Malcolm McLeod, pastor of Pasadena, (Cal.) Presbyterian church, is an able preacher (a Canadian by the way), says the Wingham Advance. Recently he offered to take charge of one of the city's daily newspapers for one issue, to show his plan of an ideal newspaper, the proceeds to be given to charitable purposes. Now Pasadena papers are both clean creditable newspapers, but that is more than can be said of Los Angeles sheets, at least most of them. Mr. McLeod succeeded in getting out a very creditable number of the Pasadena Star, but in doing so he found the editorial sanctum quite the reverse of the quiet of the pastor's study. He found such "bustle, such hurry, such rush and excitement," that one day was quite sufficient in the sanctum. Mr. McLeod is now getting \$6,000 a year with six months vacation, and an assistant pastor that does the visiting and preaches on Sunday evenings. He has accepted a call to a New York church on the following terms—salary \$15,000 a year; if he remains the pastor until he reaches a certain time of life and chooses then to retire, \$10,000 a year while he lives, should he die while in active service, his wife is to receive an annuity of several thousands during her life. We do not wonder that Mr. McLeod prefers the ministry to the strenuous life of a newspaper man. Here is what he said in closing his editorial experience one day:—"Never more shall I criticize newspaper men. I shall pray for them. They shall have my hearty forbearance henceforth and forever—the hardest worked short lived, poorest paid brain workers in this weary, old world of ours."

Death of "Harry" Lewis

It is with deep regret we report the death of Mr. Henry Lewis, known far and near as "Harry" Lewis, one of Normandy's oldest and most respected residents of the Orchardville neighborhood. Stalwart and rugged, no one thought that any serious consequences would follow the attack of typhoid fever with which he was laid up about a year ago, but he never seemed the same afterwards, although he was up and around in his well-known cheerful way, and came to town quite regularly up to a few months ago when internal complications commenced and he gradually sank until the end came last Friday. He was born in Smith's Falls, Ont., of Irish parentage and was in his 67th year. Most of his life was spent in the neighborhood where he died and where by industry and economy he prospered and had a beautiful home. He is survived by a widow and grown up family of six sons and five daughters. Three brothers, George, of Barrie, John, of Orangeville, and James, of Toronto, formerly of Mt. Forest, also survive him. The funeral on Monday to Barber's cemetery was a very large one and was conducted by Rev. G. A. King, pastor of the Orchardville Methodist church, whose ministrations during his illness were much appreciated by deceased. The pall bearers were Messrs. R. Barton, R. Robertson, and deceased four son-in-laws, J. McEachern, Jos. Dowling, T. Kirby and J. Stevenson. The late Mr. Lewis was one of the oldest subscribers of this paper and we extend our sympathy to the widow and family in their loss. —Mt. Forest Representative.
