Canada is enjoying a season of prosperity, and The Globe is keeping step with the onward march of the country.

OLD AGE ANNUITIES.

Mr. R. B. Cameron gave an address in the town hall here on Wednesday evening of last week to explain the Dominion Government's old age annuity scheme. In attendance, the meeting was a failure, but we believe Mr. Cameron has not been favored, in any of his meetings with audiences worthy of the cause he represents. This, we believe, is because the people do not understand the subject well enough, and are consequently not yet thoroughly interested.

Mr. Cameron's address was a very able one, and showed him to be well up in his subject, and that his heart was in his work as well.

In beginning his address, he said that it was his opinion that every man should make provision in some way for his old age, and that to make this easier for the middle classes, and forestall any pauperism, such as is confronting the mother country to-day, was what was largely responsible for the framing of the Annuities' Act.

In Great Britain and New Zealand, the scheme is wholly supported from the public revenue, and in France and Germany, the Government, the employer and the pensioner jointly contribute. The Canadian proposition differs from all these. What the Government proposes to do is to receive deposits from any person at any age between five and eighty years, and convert them into annuities, payable at age 55 or later, as the applicant desires. The cost of management and promotion in doing this is borne entirely by the Government.

The Government pays 4 per cent compound interest on all premiums or investments, fixing the annuities on that basis. In case of death before the annuity becomes due a return is made of all moneys paid, with interest at 3 per cent to the heirs. The lowest annuity is \$50 per annum and the highest \$600. There are no forfeitures or lapses. The applicant gets credit for all that is paid in. However, there are no withdrawals, except when the amount paid in is not sufficient to get the lowest annuity of \$50, then all payments with 3 per cent. compound interest are returned to the applicant at the annuity age of 55 years. The amount laid aside for this purpose is immune from attachment for debt, and is only payable to the applicant, he receiving it every ninety days. The applicant may, by paying an additional sum, guarantee his annuity for 5, 10, or 20 years, so that it will be paid to his heirs in case of his death during the guarantee period, and should he survive the guarantee period it would still be continued to him as long as he lived without additional charge.

Mr. Cameron also explained other workings of the scheme, which we have neither time or space to go into, but would say it is a subject deserving of more than passing thought, and worthy of the consideration of every person in Canada.
