New Signalling System.

All over the vast C. P. R. system as well as on every other railroad in Canada the railway men are busily engaged in studying up the new system of rules which goes into effect on June 1st in regard to the operation for trains. It is the standard system ordered by the Dominion railway commission which has been made the legal one for all the railroads of Canada. The work as instructor is being done on this division by Mr. Harry Holman formerly of Flesherton, but now agent at Teeswater. Under the new rules of the Commission, anybody, with anything at all—coat, trousers, hat, arms, legs, anything—has liberty to signal a train when he has discovered danger. Heretofore it required a prescribed flag, though a woman's apron shaken in the air has been known to exercise the magic power.—Markdale Standard.

Motion to Quash Dismissed.

On Monday Chief Justice Meredith dismissed the motion to quash Chesley's local option by-law known as 480 which has been up at Osgoode Hall about ten times, either on motion to prohibit Judge Barrett from certifying to same or to quash. His Lordship decided that the statutes did not prevent the Returning officer from voting on by-laws, that R. O. doing printing for the L. O. committee did not invalidate his vote and held that that the voter's list was challenged. Sir William also ruled that giving the by-law its third reading on Good Friday was not illegal. Of course it would be a difficult matter for municipal officers to observe the letter of the law and because there were irregularities His Lordship decided that in the action to quash, the town should pay its own expenses. J. B. McKenney of Toronto was solicitor for the appellant and Messrs. C. J. Mickle and Drayton, Holman and Bissett for the town. Chief Justice Meredith's decision means that Chesley goes dry for three years.—Chesley Enterprise.
