It is a significant fact that the Spanish Premier at a recent Cabinet meeting demanded that the Government inaugurate its religious program by the recognition of absolute freedom of conscience through the arrogation of all imperial decrees prohibiting the public services of non-Catholic religious bodies.

Dr. Eliot of Harvard University declares that in a short time "religion will recognize no authority spiritual or secular in matters of religious belief. Men will worship God more in their deeds than on their knees in the new religion. The two commandments of love to the Heavenly Father and fraternal love to their fellow men will be practised as well as taught. He will be best who loves best and serves best. The greatest service will be to increase the stock of good will. The new virtue that the new religion will foster will be the love of truth."

With the advent of such a religion there will be no dispute about religious dogmas, coronation oaths etc., etc.
