#### Flesherton.

John Harrison Dead—Only six days after the decease of his wife, Mr. Harrison was also called home. His death occurred on Thursday afternoon last at his late residence on the Toronto line where he lived for thirty-eight years. Mr. and Mrs. Harrison were married sixty years in January last and at the close of their long wedded life "in death they were not divided."

Mr. Harrison was born at Newland, Yorkshire, England, in October 1821, and was therefore in his 89th year. To Miss Ann Ward he was married at South in Yorkshire in 1859 and in 1872 came to Canada settling near Flesherton. Mr. Harrison was an industrious successful farmer highly respected in the community. In politics he was a Liberal and in religion a Presbyterian, a highly esteemed member of Chalmers' church here. He is survived by two sons and a daughter—Ward, of Silver Creek, N. Y.; Alfred near Flesherton, and Mrs. John Whitten, Toronto. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon at Flesherton cemetery. Service was conducted at the house by Rev. G. S. Milligan.

Mrs. Sheardown—Death claimed another highly respected resident of Artemesia in the person of Mrs. Samuel Sheardown, who passed away on the 6th inst at her home near Mount Zion aged 62 years. The funeral took place to Mt. Zion cemetery on Wednesday and the very large cortege was a mark of the high esteem in which the deceased was held. Service at the church was conducted by her pastor Rev. T. Laidlaw, who fittingly referred to the christian virtues of the departed wife and mother who had been for many years a faithful member of the Methodist church. The deceased whose maiden name was Mary Ann Bolton was married at Bolton village and came with her husband to Artemesia about thirty-five years ago. Besides her husband two sons, Samuel and Lewis and two daughters, Annie and Lydia survive her. #### How to Slay House Fly.

Ottawa, June 15—Hon. Sydney Fisher is down on the house fly, and with the aid of official entomologists has started a crusade against that pest. A circular sent out from the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, tells how one should proceed when one spies a fly.

House flies, says the circular, are now recognized as most serious carriers of the germs of certain diseases, such as typhoid fever, tuberculosis, infantile diarrhoea, etc.

They infect themselves in filth and decaying substances, and by carrying the germs on their legs and bodies they pollute food especially milk, with the germs of these and other diseases and of decay. No fly is free from germs.

#### DON'T LET THEM BREED.

House flies breed in decaying or decomposing vegetable and animal matter and excrement. They breed chiefly in stable refuse. In cities this should be stored in dark fly-proof chambers or receptacles, and it should be regularly removed within six days in the summer time. Farmyard manure should be regularly removed within the same time, and either spread on the fields or stored at a distance of not less than quarter of a mile, the further the better, from a house or dwelling.

House flies breed in such decaying and fermenting matter as kitchen refuse and garbage. Garbage receptacles should be kept tightly covered.

All such refuse should be burnt or buried within a few days, but at once if possible. No refuse should be left exposed. If it cannot be disposed of at once it should be sprinkled with chloride of lime.

#### FLIES IN HOUSES.

Windows and doors should be properly screened, especially those of the diningroom and kitchen. Milk and other food should be screened in the summer by covering it with muslin; fruit should be covered also.

Where they are used, especially in public places, as hotels, etc., spittoons should be kept clean, as there is very great danger of flies carrying the germs of consumption from unclean spittoons.

Flies should not be allowed to have access to the sick room, especially in the case of infectious disease.

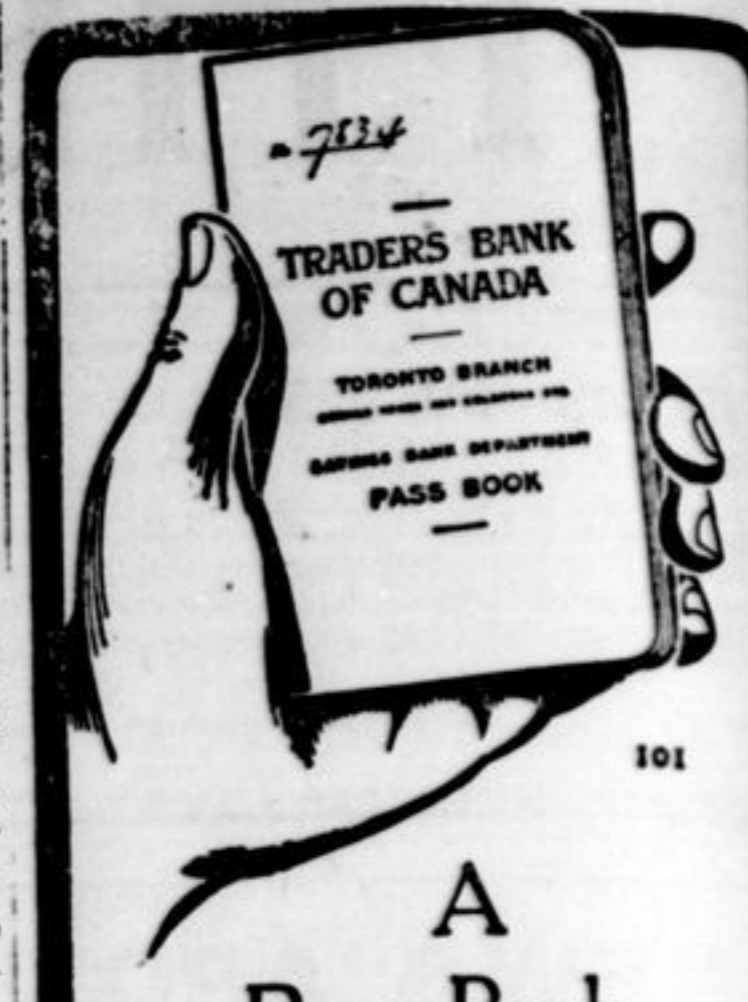
The faces of babies should be carefully screened with muslin.

Flies may be killed by means of a weak solution of formalin or formaldehyde exposed in saucers in the rooms. This is made by adding a teaspoonful of formaldehyde to a pint of water. The burning of pyrethrum in a room is also effective.

House flies indicate the presence of filth in the neighborhood or unsanitary conditions.
