OBITUARY

WILLIAM WATSON.

On Thursday, July 7th, Mr. Wm. Watson, undertaker and carriage maker of Priceville, died very suddenly from heart failure. Though ailing for the past couple of years, no fears were entertained by the family and friends, and his death was a sudden shock to the community. On the date mentioned. the deceased had worked all day in the field, and on returning, ate supper with his usual relish, and left for the shop. At the doorway, he fell and never rallied.

He was born in Nelson township, Peel county, and resided in Priceville for about forty years. He was a member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, under whose auspices he was buried at Salem church, in the township of Proton, about forty of the members being in attendance at the burial. He leaves a widow. three sons, Wm., in Priceville, Henry, in Vancouver; and Edward in Durham, and two daughters, in Priceville.

A DOUBLE MISFORTUNE.

W. P. Taylor's stock of groceries was destroyed early Sunday morning. About 2 a. m. the fire alarm awakened the citizens and the brigade to the knowledge that a fire was in progress Nightwatchman Swanston passing Taylor's store on the corner of Durham and Victoria streets noticed smoke issuing from the cellar windows and hastily rang the alarm. When the brigade arrived so dense was the smoke pouring from every opening that the part of the cellar in which the flames were, could not be located. Two streams of water were turned into the cellar and it was thought that the flames were extinguished. On opening up the store doors, however, the draught cused a burst of flames to shoot up at the back of the store and the hose was hastily turned on and the fire extinguished. Considerable damage was done to the stock from water and smoke. Had the fire got a little more headway there might have been a serious conflagration for Vogan's hardware is next door with a large stock of oils. However the fire did not reach there though the place was full of smoke. Myles and Petteplace had their stock of casket linings and thite caskets damaged by the smoke, which permeated the un-

dertaking rooms. On Monday morning about 8.30 Chief Ferguson noticed smoke issuing from the roof and the garret windows of W. P. Taylor's house and rang in the alarm. The family were unaware that the house was on fire until informed by some of the neighbors and the children who were in bed were hastily gotten out and when the crowd gathered the furniture was carried out. The fire was probably caused by a defective chimney in the kitchen for when discovered the roof was on fire under the shin was seen issuing from the roof of the front part of the house also. After about half an hour the fire was extinguished.-Telescope.


