Another disastrous fire in the business section of the town was happily averted by being discovered in time on Sunday morning in the McIntyre Block. A great o'clock, Mr. McIntyre, who occupies the upper flat of the building, became aware of smoke coming from below, and, investigating, found that the trouble was a portion of the building owned by Harry Barnett as a tailor and haberdashery. Gaining entrance, he found that a pile of charcoal had caught fire, and a hole had already been burned in the floor. It would not have taken a great deal more time to cause a serious conflagration. As it was, however, the fire was easily extinguished, and practically no damage done. How the char became ignited, is a mystery. It is thought to have started by a burning match being dropped on it the evening before.

Shareholders of the North Portland Cement Co. will meet this time of an offer made for purchase of the plant, as no have been sent out calling a meeting of the stockholders in Toronto, on Wednesday, the 17th of August. In their general letter to the shareholders, the Directors, through their secretary, have carefully explained the character of the people who have opened negotiations with them, and as to their ability carry out any contract they make in the way of purchase of the undertakings of the company and the Directors are well satisfied on this score. They say that that uncertain condition of the cement trade, of competition and of politics make it advisable that no fair opportunity for holding the condition of the shareholders should be passed by without most serious consideration. A definite offer has yet been made and the Board expresses a desire that the meeting should be fully attended.
