Moir, the insane murderer, who escaped from Hamilton asylum last week, was re-captured on Saturday last near St. David's. Two of the asylum attendants, McCulloch and Trapnell, were arrested on suspicion of having aided the insane murderer, making their escape. The former has pleaded guilty, but the latter says he is innocent of the suspected charge.

Readers of this paper will have learned that everything is going along smoothly in the erection of the new Clerk's Office and Weigh Scales, and on Friday last an injunction was served on the contractor, to restrain them from going on with the work. Some time ago, a lot was purchased by the council for the purpose, we believe, of placing a weigh scales thereon. The council, as far as we know, were unanimous in the purchase, as the property was looked upon as a public investment. A portion of the Council thought it wise to go on with the erection of the building and scale. To this, the contractor objected, on the ground that such expenditure should be incurred without submitting by-law to ascertain the feeling of the people. He was in the majority, however, and the contract, let, and operations began. In meantime, the adjacent city began to protest against the weigh scales as a nuisance, claiming its proximity to their property would cause a depreciation in value. Mr. Calder, in the meantime, conceived the idea of converting the property into a park, and hence the dispute. Matter is to be thrashed out at Goode Hall this week, the objection of the complainants being to a permanent injunction against erection of the weigh scale, and the accompanying stockyards, by-law asking that the Council authorized to issue debentures extending over a period of years, is to be voted on Sept.
