WHEREAS it is desirable to construct and erect a market building and Clerk's Office in the Town of Durham, according to the plans 1 therefor prepared by George 1 Kress, Esquire, and adopted by 1 the Council of the said Town of Durham, and to raise the sum of \$2000 to be applied to the said 1

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue de- 1 bentures of the said Town for the sum of \$2000 as hereinafter provided (which is the debt intended to be created by this By-law) the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purpose afore- a said, and to no other purpose: AND WHEREAS it is desirable

to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly instalments during the period of ten years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate a- 11 mount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect to of said debt shall be as nearly as payable in each of the other nine years of said period (as shewn in Schedule "A" hereto annexed: AND WHEREAS the total

THE said debentures bear interest at the rate of per centum per annum, payable yearly at the said Bank at the Town of Durham on the first day of October in each and every year during the currency thereof. and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Town of Durham:


