MARKET SCALE SITE.

To whom it may concern. This question has the appearance of a pool of water—you pitch a stone into it, and the ever-increasing circles of waves widen and extend until the whole body of water is agitated.

A scheme may look fair and reasonable at first sight, it may appear like a mud-puddle, clean water on the surface, but probe it and what is the result? The covered-up selfishness and unfairness oozes to the top.

The problem of securing a market site that would satisfactorily meet the demands of the farmers and buyers and that would be more convenient generally than is the present site, is not new.

Any councillor should know that the ratepayers are the masters in matters of this sort, and if they think the expenditure is not needed at the present time, all they have to do is to vote against the By-law.

Now, what is Mayor Laidlaw's position in reference to the present scheme? When the proposed site is removed sufficiently far away from his own residence that it will not depreciate nor impair its value, and yet near enough that his own business interests may be enhanced, does he apply the Golden Rule?

BY-LAW No. 577.

of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Durham.

A by-law to provide for the purchase of land for a site, and for the construction and erection thereon of a market building and Town Clerk's Office, and to authorize the issue of debentures of the said Town of Durham to the amount of \$2000 for the purpose of raising the sum required therefor.

WHEREAS it is desirable to construct and erect a market building and Clerk's Office in the Town of Durham, according to the Plans therefor prepared by George Kress, Esquire, and adopted by the Council of the said Town of Durham, and to raise the sum of \$2000 to be applied to the said purpose:

AND WHEREAS in order thereof it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Town for the sum of \$2000 as hereinafter provided (which is the debt intended to be created by this By-law) the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purpose aforesaid, and to no other purpose:

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly instalments during the period of ten years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount payable in each of the other years of the said period (as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed):

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$259.01:

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Town of Durham, according to the last revised Assessment Roll thereof is \$71,520.00:

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Municipality, and also of the local improvement debt secured by special rates or assessments, is \$32,122.60, and there is no part of the principal or interest of the said existing debt in arrears:

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham, enacts as follows:

- 1. The Municipal Council of the said Town of Durham shall expend the sum of \$2000 in the purchase of land for a site, and in the construction and erection of a market building and Clerk's Office, at the said Town of Durham, and for the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said Town to the amount of \$2000 as aforesaid shall be issued on the first day of October, A. D., 1910, each of which debenture shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof and shall be payable within ten years thereafter at the office of the Standard Bank of Canada at the said Town of Durham:

- 2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town of Durham and by the Treasurer thereof, and the Clerk of the said Town of Durham shall attach thereto the Corporate Seal of the Municipality.

- 3. THE said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable yearly at the said Bank at the Town of Durham on the first day of October in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Town of Durham:

- 4. DURING the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Town of Durham, the sum of \$259.01 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt (as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed):

- 5. THIS By-law shall take effect on and from the final passing thereof by the Municipal Council of the Town of Durham:

- 6. THE votes of the electors of the said Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-law at the following times and places, that is to say:—On Friday the second day of September next, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing till five o'clock of the same day, by the following deputy returning officers: In north ward at McGrath's store by Clifton Elvidge as deputy returning officer; In east ward at the Town Hall by W. P. Paterson as deputy returning officer, and in west ward at Jas. Carson's Office by John Smith as deputy returning officer:

- 7. ON Thursday the first day of September next, the Mayor of the said Town of Durham shall attend at the Clerk's Office at the said Town of Durham at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid, and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-law, respectively:

THE Clerk of the Council of the said Town of Durham shall attend at his office in the said Town of Durham at ten o'clock in the forenoon of Saturday the third day of September, A. D., 1910, to sum up the number of votes for and against this By-law. Dated at the Council Chamber 2.
