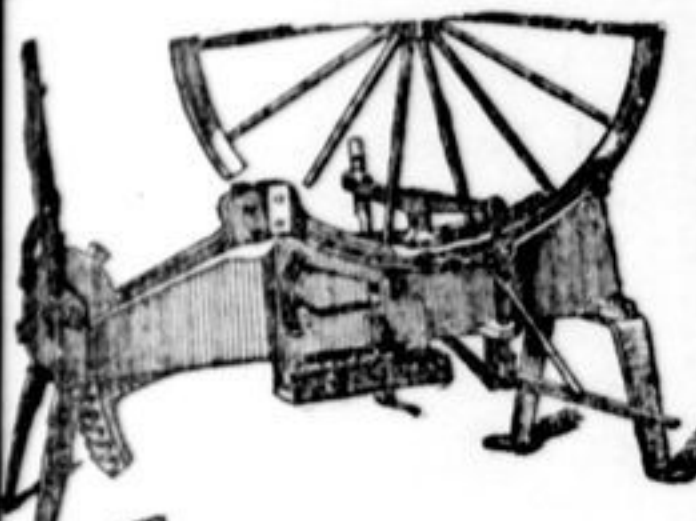

HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

Warm apple sauce and huckleberry muffins are a favorite combination in some parts of New England.

Essences and flavoring extracts containing alcohol should be added to boiled desserts just after cooking.

Avoid drinking water that has stood in open vessels for some time. It may have taken up many impurities.

Raw beef bones should never be thrown away, for, if broken into small pieces, they will make some excellent stock.

Rugs should not be shaken, but instead, hang them on a clothes line and beat with a cane beater kept for the purpose.

If the leaves are baked too brown, rub them, when cold, with a coarse grater to remove all the brown crust.

Some housewives say that a teaspoonful of vinegar added to the water in which cabbage is boiled will dissipate obnoxious odors.

To get dust out of crevices in window sashes and wainscoting, try using a flat paint brush of good size, for a cloth cannot reach all the corners.

Tiled walls are improved by wiping off once a week with skimmed milk, after first being carefully dusted and washed off with a wet cloth.

Where moths are troublesome, scatter bitter apple under the papers in the drawers and at the back of the chest where the drawers slide in.

After each meal there should be a thorough airing of the home. No matter how perfect the system of ventilation, it is impossible to prevent cooking odors.

To clean a terra cotta figure, wash it with plenty of soap and water, and then scour with sand. When perfectly clean, rinse it under the tap, and then stand near the fire to dry.

Wallpaper that has been soiled by a smoky fire or lamp may be cleaned by using a hard, dry sponge, the stiffer and harder the better. Rub the wall briskly with it.

When making linen blouses, stitch a linen tape down the middle of the band in front, where the buttons go, and sew the latter to this. It will prevent them from tearing out of the blouse.

Doctors are agreed that a liberal proportion of fruit should be a part of the diet of all who value health and bodily welfare. But it is of great importance that the fruit be sound and ripe, otherwise it is often dangerous.

Toothache, neuralgia, headache, a sprained ankle or wrist, may all be relieved by fomentations. The way to do this is to take a flannel cloth, wring it out in boiling water, and apply it to the affected part of the body. As soon as the cloth cools off, dip it in the hot water again, and keep up the application until the pain is relieved.

THE WESTERN FAIR A GOOD LIVE STOCK EXHIBITION. September 9th to 17th This Year

The Western Fair, London, Ontario, as a Live Stock Exhibition is becoming more popular every year. Breeders and Stockmen always report good results from exhibiting their animals at London.

The classification for the different breeds of Live Stock is well arranged in the Prize List and the prizes offered are extra good this year. In addition to the cash prizes there are a number of specialties, one of which is a Silver Tea Service, value \$40.00, for the best Two-Year-Old Filly bred in Canada, given by "The Canadian Farm." This should bring out a good entry in this class.

The cash prizes for the Cattle, Sheep and Swine are all increased this year and a large entry is expected. The rule withholding third prize when no competition is offered has been withdrawn, and all prizes may be awarded if the animals are worthy. Medals may be given in some sections in the Sheep Department. The Dog and Cat Show will again be a feature this year. Monday, Sept. 12th, will be Athletic Day, when a popular programme of sports, including a Tug-of-War, will be put on. All information will be given on application to the Secretary, London, Ontario.

FARM LABORERS' EXCURSIONS \$10.00 To Winnipeg.

It has been found that the farm laborers' excursions already run from Ontario points, have not produced as many laborers as expected and, as the harvesting operations in Ontario are about over for this year, two additional excursions are being run from all stations in Ontario by the Canadian Pacific Railway at rate of \$10 to Winnipeg and points east of Moose Jaw on Main Line and Branch Lines on Tuesday, August 30th, and Tuesday, September 6th. Special Trains will be run through from Toronto to Winnipeg with no change of cars, thus avoiding transfer troubles and customs arrangements en route. Tickets will be issued to women, but there will be no half rate tickets for children.

A CHAIN OF ACCIDENTS.

A series of exciting events followed the accident to John Sinclair Wednesday night. While working in the stable between ten and eleven, Mr. Sinclair, who lives on Superior street, just outside the town was kicked by a horse, the blow breaking his thigh. The ambulance was summoned, and removed the injured man to the general hospital, where he is now resting easy and doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. When Mr. Sinclair was being taken into the hospital, the ambulance driver left his place to give a hand with the stretcher, telling one of the men who came with him to look after the horses. But everyone followed into the building and the horses became frightened and dashed away. At the corner of 4th avenue they crashed into a pole, smashing the tongue and whipstretcher, bending both axles and badly damaging the front of the body. It will take two weeks to repair the damage to the ambulance. The pole that was struck carried a fire alarm bell. It snapped off carrying down in its fall a network of wires. The fire alarm wires became crossed, which the firemen responded, which they did in lively style they found that there was not a fire, they had still something to do. A lot of wires were lying around some shooting high power currents into the pools of water by the roadside, and making it dangerous to work around the spot where the ambulance was tangled up with the pole. It is said that when the wires were cut and cleared away the water in some of the pools was boiling. Everything was soon cleared up and the firemen got back to the hall by midnight.
