HOUSEHOLD HELPS

A little washing soda, if mixed in the black lead, will remove all grease and give a splendid polish to grates and fenders.

To make up a fire to last for hours, wet any waste paper, press into balls, place on the fire, cover with small coal and cinders.

You need a larger pair of shoes in summer than in winter, and it is always best to try them on in the latter part of the day.

Take your clothes from the line as soon as possible after they are dry. They are likely to become too stiff if left out longer than necessary.

Never waken a child suddenly, and never carry a baby immediately into a glaring light when he wakes up; the sudden impression of light is very bad for the eyes.

Instead of taking lace yokes and cuffs out of dresses to wash when soiled, if they are rubbed with dry starch, then rubbed thoroughly, the lace will look like new.

Apply glycerine to a scald immediately the accident happens, and cover it up with strips of rag soaked in glycerine. If the glycerine is not at hand, apply salad oil in the same way.

In preserving, canning and jelly-making, iron or tin utensils should never be used. The fruit acids attack these metals, and so give a bad color and metallic taste to the products.

Tarnished silver is easily cleaned with powdered whiting mixed to a paste with ammonia and water. Rub the paste on with one leather and have another leather to polish it off again.

Gilt on china will not last long if soda be used in the washing of it; therefore, use soapy water for washing teacups, etc., patterned with gilt, and keep soda carefully away from them.

Do not put eggs into rice puddings, as they are really wasted. All that is required in addition to the rice and milk is a small piece of butter. These puddings, to be good, must be cooked quite three hours very slowly.

In laundering colored shirt waists or negligé shirts, use lukewarm water with plenty of salt in it, and a moderate application of pure white soap. Dry wrong side out in the shade, and remove from the line as soon as dried.

Many old gilt picture frames can be much improved by being enamelled white, or even in colors to match the paint work. For instance, black and white drawings hung on a brown wall paper, may be placed in scarlet frames.

The stains left from coffee may be removed from the most delicate silk, woollen, or chiffon garment by brushing with pure glycerine. Then brush with lukewarm water and press on the wrong side. The glycerine absorbs the coloring matter.

To whiten flannels made yellow by age, dissolve 1-2 lb. of white soap in about twelve gallons of soft water, adding two-thirds of an ounce of spirits of ammonia. Place the flannel articles in this solution, stir well for a short time, and then wash in ordinary.

Before using plates, pie dishes, etc., for cooking purposes, it is a very wise plan to put them in a pan of cold water. Place over the fire and let the water come to a boil. By so doing, you will find the heat of the oven will not crack them so easily.

ENGLAND'S FIFTH GEORGE

Since his accession the new Sovereign has, on the whole borne himself through a very trying period with dignity and good sense. The addresses he has had to issue to the nation, to the army and navy, to the British Empire at large, to the Houses of Parliament, and to the Princes and peoples of India, have been couched in excellent language. I do not suppose that King George was their sole author, but I am assured he had a far larger hand in preparing them and in laying down their general lines than most Sovereigns have. The King has a real gift of energetic expression. He used to be a poor speaker; he is now perhaps the most eloquent Sovereign who has ever sat on a British throne. Like most sailors, he is free and voluble of speech, a hearty and persistent talker, a man of naive, elementary nature. If he used to seem constrained and out of place on a country platform, it was not because he lacked ideas or the words to clothe them, but because he is essentially a shy and rather nervous man, and because his life at sea had never given him that invaluable early training in facing audiences and holding the centre of the stage on ceremonial occasions. But experience and practice have overcome his diffidence, and King George though his rhetoric will never rival the Kaiser's, rises considerably above the level of ordinary British oratory.—Harper's Weekly.

CANADA OWNS HUDSON BAY.

Washington, Sept. 18.—That Canada has exclusive rights in Hudson Bay is now conceded by many people here. This decision has grown since the decision of The Hague Tribunal has been more carefully scanned. The tribunal was asked to determine from what point the three marine miles shall be measured in the case of bays and creeks and the answer was that "in the case of bays, the three marine miles are to be measured from a straight line drawn across the body of water at the place where it ceases to have the configuration and characteristics of a bay." At all other places the three marine miles are to be measured following the sinuosities of the coast.

Light is thrown upon the meaning of this decision by the subsequent treatment of the larger bays on the coast. The Bay de Chaleur, for instance, is declared to be a closed bay, and the line is to be drawn from the points where the bay ends, that is, from two headlands at the mouth of the bay. These headlands are twenty or twenty-five miles apart. Fortune Bay, in Newfoundland, is also a closed bay, the entrance to Fortune Bay, from headland to headland, is thirty miles wide. Thus, notwithstanding the width of the entrance to the bay, the bay is recognized as exclusive British property.

The entrance to Hudson Bay is narrow and is British territory. From Button Island, which is the most northerly point on the coast this side of the strait leading to the bay, to Hatten Head, the southerly point on Resolution Island, is a little more than thirty miles. Possibly, the figure, by actual measurement, may be thirty-five miles. After passing through this narrow gate, the strait widens until Hudson Bay is reached. The decision of The Hague court is thought to mean that in a case of this kind the interior waters are national, and not common to all.

By a decision of the press it is admitted that the decision of Hague Tribunal settles the question in favor of Canada. As Administration organ says the judgment is a definite pronouncement on the whole headland question.

The United States has contended that the three-mile limit followed the sinuosities of the coast and allowed fishing in the bays when the outer headlands were more than six miles apart. The British contention is that territorial jurisdiction extends seaward from a line drawn between the outer headlands, no matter how wide the bay that is enclosed. The Hague Tribunal affirms the British view, which shuts out American boats from fishing, not only in the bays of Newfoundland and Labrador, but apparently also, in that vast expanse of water, Hudson Bay, in which our whaling and fishing craft have been accustomed to roam, and exercise fishing and whaling rights under the American flag.

After mentioning some of the great arms of the sea from which the United States fishermen are excluded, the paper adds,—"For fifty-one years we have argued that these were not bays under territorial jurisdiction, but The Hague Tribunal takes up these very bays and draws a line across their mouth from headland to headland leaving all within to territorial jurisdiction. Not one of them but is relatively more open than Hudson Bay, and this splendid sheet must be reluctantly yielded to Canadian territorial jurisdiction."

The decision will have an important bearing upon the fortunes of the great fishing industry now carried on in Hudson Bay by United States fishermen. It means that this business will have to come to an end unless Canada makes some agreement under which it can be continued. In the past, the sealers and whalers have been allowed to prosecute their calling, and even to winter on the Canadian islands. But it is not probable that these liberties will be voluntarily given in the future.

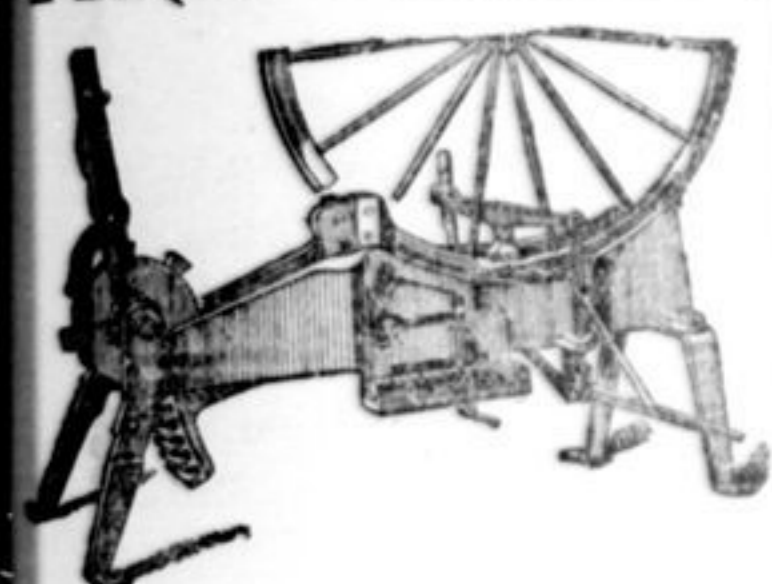
