## California's Greatest Oil Well.

It was the persistency of a single man that discovered the greatest oil well in California and what is perhaps the richest well in the history of the oil industry. A discouraged Board of Directors, three days before the gusher was struck decided to quit drilling. The order was given, but the superintendent conveniently forgot it. He drilled forty-seven feet more against penalty of dismissal, and then the big bit entered the oil sands. The gusher started to spout on the morning of March 15, and save for a period of eight hours in which it "sanded up," on March 21, after which it burst forth of its own accord, like a volcano of oil, the well flowed continuously. Up to May 3rd, it had delivered 2,000,000 barrels of oil.

The stream now rises intermittently from 170 to 240 feet above the top of the derrick, which, before the crown, or top, was carried away by the stream of oil, was 84 feet in height. The oil sands were struck at 2,300 feet, at which point a tremendous gas pressure was encountered, and the drillers were suddenly amazed at seeing small rocks hurled hundreds of feet in the air through the eight-inch casing. After the oil sands were struck, the well rapidly "drilled itself" to a greater depth. The well promises to keep spouting for many months to come.

The well can be heard roaring for more than a mile. Spray from the gusher has been carried a distance of two and a half miles, and hundreds of automobiles have carried sightseers from Bakersfield to witness the unique sight. The sagebrush for a distance of half a mile around the well is coated with oil, and several jackrabbits, killed by the flow, were brought by small boys into Maricopa.—Chicago News.

## It Pays To Advertise.

Think of it as you like, it pays to do judicious advertising, and business men are becoming more and more alive to its importance. Don't think we wish to infer a man can't do business if he doesn't advertise in a newspaper. He certainly can do business, but he can do more business if he makes a proper use of printer's ink. There is no business man who doesn't advertise in some way. The mere sight of "John Jones, Grocer," over his door is a means of calling public attention to the fact that tea, coffee, cocoa, and other kindred articles in the grocery line may be purchased there. The proprietor of the concern may not realize it as advertising, but it is advertising just the same. The merchant who fits up a pretty window is doing so for the purpose of advertising his business. He may not call it by that name, but it is one way of telling the public that he has certain articles for sale. It is simply a way of advertising. Big city merchants are not giving space for the simple pleasure of keeping up the newspaper of the day. If the money spent in this doesn't bring returns, they'll quit, but they don't quit, because it pays as a business investment. It isn't likely that patent medicine men from all over the continent are paying good money into the Chronicle in exchange for newspaper space just because they love the editor, or any member of the staff. Not much; they advertise because it pays to advertise, and as soon as they have to pay them, they quit, that's all there is about it. Local business men are not all giving the best use of their privy. If they are doing as much business as they want to do, they need no need of spending money, if they want to do more business, they should try judicious advertising in the Chronicle.
