DIED IN HEPWORTH.

FIRE AT GRAND VALLEY.

At an early hour on Sunday morning fire broke out and entirely destroyed the McIntyre Block at Grand Valley. The building was occupied by J. McIntyre & Sons, flour and feed; Geo. Lawson, shoes; the Weather Insurance Co's head office, and Geo. Davey, men's furnishings. Very little of the contents was saved. The volunteer brigade, by hard fighting, succeeded in keeping the fire from spreading. Luckily, the rain commenced falling slightly, thus preventing one of the worst fires in the history of the village. The origin of the fire is unknown. The village and township clerk's office was situated in the building, and unfortunately, the village and township records are lost. The losses are partly covered by insurance.—Elora Express.

JUSTICES LONG MEMORY.

HIGH COST OF LIVING.

A rummager among old papers of the date of 1855 found the following prices, which will be of interest in comparison with the prices of the present time: 2 lbs. nails, 16c.; 1 pound of tea, \$1.25; 7 yards calico, at 22 cents per yard; and 19 1-2 yds. at 33c. per yd.; 83 pounds beef, at 2c. lb.; butter as low as 4c. and 5c. a pound; black muslin, 19c. yd.; corn, 12 1-2 to 15c. per bushel; fresh pork, 3c. lb.; 2 hogs weighing 340 lbs. each at 2 1-2c. lb.; brown sugar, 12 1-2 cents per pound; eggs, 2c. doz.

We doubt if the prices were stated as above, as the calculation at that time was made in pounds, shillings and pence, and not in dollars and cents, as to-day.—Ed.

WHERE DIAMONDS FAIL.

"I frequently get interesting watches to repair," remarked a jeweller. "Here is one, for instance, with diamond jewels, and would you believe it, notwithstanding the hardness of the diamond, diamond jewels do not wear as well as the jewels found in the ordinary watch, the sapphire or ruby jewels. Many people place an exaggerated value on their watches, because the latter have diamond jewels. A few years ago, a collector of watches showed me a watch which had been picked up on the battlefield of Waterloo. The watch was a most elaborate affair, having a beautifully chased movement and diamond jewels. The jewels had actually been worn through by the steel pivot. Diamonds are all right as ornaments, and in the form of ornaments, very serviceable for many mechanical purposes, but for watch jewels the diamond is more ornamental than useful."

SUICIDE BY HANGING.

A sentence was caused in Dundalk Thursday forenoon of last week, when Richard Neithercut, of Melancthon, came into town, and reported the discovery of a man unknown to him hanging to the branch of a small sized bushy tree at the line fence between Percy Neithercut's and the Hughes farms about two miles from town. Coroner Dr. Martin, and Constable Hemphill hastened to the place and were able to identify the body as that of James Fachnie, of Osprey, a lunatic, who had escaped from Hamilton Asylum over a year ago. The gruesome find soon attracted a crowd. After viewing the remains, the coroner deemed an inquest unnecessary, and the constable had the body removed, and placed in the town hall here.

From its decomposed state the body is supposed to have been hanging about a week. The deceased had not been seen for about that period. The body was partly covered with low branches and although only about five rods from the scene the view was somewhat obscured, and for this reason was not discovered sooner.

A couple of weeks previous, Fachnie had wandered away from his home near Badjeros, and created some worry among the farmers at Redickville. He carried a pitchfork as a weapon, and was under the delusion that he must use it on someone. He was captured there and escaped from Constable Snider, of Shelburne, on Sunday, Aug. 28th. On Tuesday following, he was again captured by neighbors near his own home, after a hard chase, and again turned over to Constable Snider, who let him escape the second time while driving with him in a buggy a couple of miles from Dundalk. The constable had the man's hands tied with two hame straps. Notwithstanding this, he was able to get clear away, and the constable gave up the chase. The poor unfortunate roamed around in the neighborhood where he escaped for a day or so, in a starving condition, and this was the last seen of him alive. A week later his body was discovered as above, hanging by the straps which tied his hands when he got away from the constable.

Constable Hemphill sent word to the father of Fachnie, who is a well-to-do sawmiller, at Dunedin, and he came Thursday evening for the remains. Interment was made at Badjeros cemetery on Friday. The deceased was thirty-one years old, and leaves a widow and several small children.

It is difficult to understand why the Hamilton Asylum authorities did not insist on his return to their keeping at the time he was permitted to escape from them.—Dundalk Herald.

RADCLIFFE STILL ACTIVE.

Those who have read the accounts of the numerous hangings in the Province of Ontario at the hands of one Arthur Ellis, have wondered perhaps what had become of John Radcliffe, Radcliffe, most skillful of executioners, is in the West, and his abilities are by no means rusting for lack of use. An interview with him in the Daily Columbian, of New Westminster, B.C., records a visit to that city. He said that he felt more at home in New Westminster than in any other city in Canada, with the exception of Toronto. Mr. Radcliffe is not inactive, for at this city of his choice he hanged a Japanese murderer and in the same week put an end to two Indians who were lying under sentence of death at Kamloops. "The work is telling on me a good deal now," said the famous hangman, and added that continuous travel was impossible at his time of life. "As a matter of fact," he added, "there is too much work for a man of my profession in this country, and I am glad to see that some provinces are engaging executioners of their own." He gave as an instance of the necessity for assistance, that hangings were booked for the same day at Edmonton and in Ontario. Radcliffe incidentally mentioned his interest in the game of lacrosse, and regretted that he could not entertain himself by visiting a match which seemed to be the most important event of the day in New Westminster. The reader can only express the hope that his interest in lacrosse was not professional.

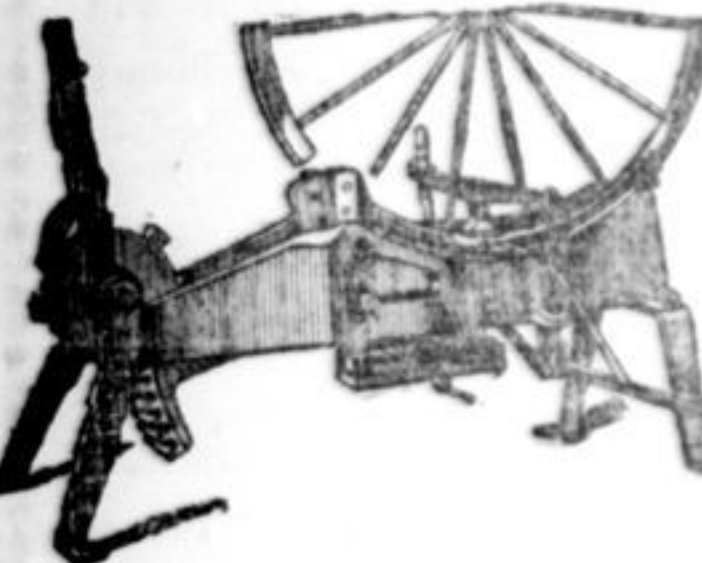
