The story of the police, who have looked into the case, is that while she and her husband were ill, her three little children were taken in charge by the Children's Aid Society in Collingwood and placed out in homes. On her recovery the absence of her children preyed upon her mind to such an extent that she has reached her unfortunate mental condition. The dilemma that the society finds itself in is that the woman is now in no condition to care for her children. If they were returned to her, the child she carries is not over a year old and neighbors say that her treatment of it is anything but calculated to keep it alive or healthy, while the risk it runs while in its mother's arms at all hours of the night could easily result in the loss of its life. The case is pitiful in the extreme, but surely there should be some way of taking the poor woman off the streets, so her disposition is apparently no harm as to not warrant her being placed under restraint. Her husband is unable to do anything to restrict her wandering and is a laboring man in such poor circumstances as not to be able to afford much relief to a trying situation.—Times.

PARTNERSHIP ENDED. The partnership which existed for twenty-six years between Messrs Crossley and Hunter, evangelists, has had to be dissolved through the physical disability of Mr. Hunter. The names and evangelistic work of Crossley and Hunter are as famous in Canada as were those of Moody and Sankey in the United States. Rev. Mr. Hunter has fallen a victim to palsy, as the result of long-continued arduous toiling in the cause of Christianity. For more than a quarter of a century Mr. Hunter labored incessantly in a work which made a terrific drain on his nervous energy.
