GENERAL NEWS ITEMS.

Gilbert Plains, Manitoba, had a fire on Friday last, which caused a loss estimated at \$100,000. Two blocks were consumed.

Brandon Asylum was burned on Friday last. The 600 inmates were saved.

A fatal collision on the Wabash Railway occurred last Friday at Corinth Station, near St. Thomas. The engineer, Geo. Smith, was killed instantly; the fireman escaped by jumping. An open switch is given as the cause.

The solid brick Grand Trunk Station at Goderich was destroyed by fire on Sunday. Loss above \$25,000. Supposed to have originated from a crossed electric current.

At the Grand Valley fall fair last month, George Swain, a hotel-keeper, struck Samuel Still, over the head with a beer bottle, inflicting serious injuries. The case, which was to have been tried at Orangeville, Saturday, has been settled, Swain paying the complainant \$180 and assuming all costs.

An information has been made out, charging James Bates, of London, with manslaughter, his infant child having died, according to the coroner's jury, of starvation and neglect.

MARK TWAIN'S ESTATE.

The inventory of Mark Twain's estate, returned by the appraisers, Albert Bigelow Paine, and Harry A. Lounsbury, to the Probate Court for the District of Redding, gives a total of \$611,136, of which \$70,000 represents the value of his home, "Stormfield," and the cottage known as the "Lobster Pot," while \$541,136 is personal property. The sole heir is his only surviving child, Mrs. Ossip Gabrilovitch, the wife of the Russian pianist.

LARGEST IN ONTARIO.

The Southampton bridge across the Saugeen River has been taken over by the Bruce County Council from the Hunter Bridge and Boiler Co., and has been declared for public travel. The bridge is said to be the largest public bridge in Ontario. The bridge cost \$31,000, of which the Dominion Government bears \$3000, the balance is to be paid by the county of Bruce. The bridge is 396 feet long, there are two massive concrete abutments, and two concrete piers, the highest being 45 feet, and below these there are spiles driven from 18 to 22 feet in depth. The superstructure is all of steel and rises to a height of 28 feet. The floor of the bridge is covered with 3-inch plank, 16 feet wide.—O.S. Sun.

HOW IT APPEARED TO PAT.

At the next session of the Ontario Legislature they will miss Joe Downey, who has forsaken politics and South Wellington, to be superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane, at Orillia. The other day in the Parliament buildings he told this one:

KEEP THE PIGS APART.

Mr. T.H. Hanlan, of Newmanville killed and dressed a 12-month-old hog last week. It dressed 611 pounds—which made it a mighty valuable porker. Mr. Hanlan got the pig, a Berks-Yorkshire cross, at six months, and kept it in an individual pen, feeding it twice daily; the ration was half a gallon of corn meal and shorts to six quarts of milk or whey. "That pig never saw the light of day," says Mr. Hanlan. He has been making a test with five pigs four being kept in one pen together, and the odd one by itself. The porker occupying an individual pen gets exactly one-fourth as much feed as the others, but is gaining faster than any of them. Mr. Hanlan is being rapidly converted to the doctrine of keeping pigs apart.—Kempville Advance.

PURIFYING DRINKING WATER.

The laboratory of the Provincial Board of Health sends out the following method of purifying drinking water, and we pass it on for the benefit of our readers.

A level teaspoonful of chloride of lime should be rubbed into a teacup of water. This solution should be diluted with three cupfuls of water, and a teaspoonful of the whole quantity should be added to each two gallon pail of drinking water. This will give 4 or 5 parts of free chlorine to a million parts of water, and will in ten minutes destroy all typhoid and colon bacilli or other dysentery-producing organisms in the water. Moreover, all traces of the chloride will rapidly disappear.

This method of purification has been tested with Toronto Bay water inoculated with millions of bacteria. Every germ has been destroyed, and it has been unnecessary to boil the water.

This method should be very valuable for miners, prospectors, campers, and those living in summer resorts, where the condition of the waters might not be above suspicion.
