BURNT BY ELECTRIC CURRENT.

Judgment was reserved by Justice Riddeil in Barrie last week in the case of Young vs the Town of Gravenhurst, and it will be handed out at Osgoode Hall.
The action was brought by Mrs. A.M. Young, on behalf of her son, aged about twelve years, to recover \$34,000 damages for injuries received through an electric shock from wires served by the town's power plant.

On Tuesday morning, March 8th, while lying in bed with his head resting against the iron bedstead, the lad laid hold of a lamp socket, and immediately an electric current passed through his body, burning his left arm to the shoulder, and making wounds clear thru the skull to the brain. His left arm was amputated below the elbow, and an operation was performed upon his head.

An unusually high voltage, due to defect in the plant, is alleged by the plaintiff as the cause of the accident.

A WORD TO SINGERS.

There appears to be a growing desire among Canadian vocal artists to cultivate the vibrato to such a degree that the effect is a disagreeable wobble. In Toronto we have many excellent church choir soloists with good quality voices and with musical intelligence in interpreting the solos they sing, but so many of them spoil the charm of their voices with this continuous and distracting vibrato. Why this questionable attainment should be cultivated is difficult to understand. W. H. Breare caresses this style of singing as a fault, and has it so placed in his book, entitled "Vocal Faults." Some soloists in our churches tremble to such an extent that the pitch of the note is disturbed. The writer heard a quartette some weeks ago when some of the voices wobbled so that the effect of the ensemble singing was all out of tune. The great artists, such as Gaskiel, McBa, Sembrich and others, who have sung in Toronto are also utterly free from this defect, and it is therefore more difficult to understand why our singers should adopt it. This wobble is not artistic, in fact, it is a hindrance to artistic results, neither is it pleasing to the listener.

When the Sheffield choir sang in Toronto their soloists made a great impression on the audiences, the purity and steadiness of their tones being much commented upon which was due to entire absence of this wobble. Some of our soloists seem to think that the more they tremble the more likely their singing will be to bring tears to the eyes of their audiences. If tears did flow, it would be from a deep feeling of pity, and not from sentimental emotion. Had W.S. Gilbert heard some of our local tremoloists at the time he was writing "The Mikado," he would have included in his list of 'social offenders who might well be underground,' the 'wobbling vocalist, who never would be missed. Let the desire and ambition of all soloists be the production of pure, steady tones, which will result in all round improvement in church solo singing.—Toronto Star.
