DEATH OF MRS. JAS. MURDOCK

After an illness of five weeks, Mrs. James Murdock, 843 Fifth Ave. E., passed away at an early hour this morning. Mrs. Murdock had been in ill health with stomach trouble since last spring, but five weeks ago, she took typhoid fever. Her illness was of a most serious nature, and on several occasions her condition was critical and for the past three days no hope has been held out for her recovery. The end came about 1:30 this morning. Mrs. Murdock, whose maiden name was Mary Durrant, was 52 years of age. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Durrant, of Holstein, Ont., and was born in Waterloo County. She was first married to Mr. D. Roberts, who predeceased her. Six years ago, she was married to Mr. Murdock, and a few months later they moved from Holstein to Owen Sound, and have since resided here. Mrs. Murdock was held in high esteem by all who knew her, and her demise is mourned by a wide circle of friends. Besides her sorrowing husband, Mr. James Murdock, Inspector of Weights and Measures, she is survived by her parents, in Holstein, and three sisters and four brothers. Her sisters are Mrs. Knight, Denver, Col.; Mrs. St. Ledger, St. Paul, Minn.; Mrs. Orchard, Egremont twp., and Mrs. Moses, Toronto. Her brothers are James, of Egremont twp.; Alvan, in Saskatchewan; and John, in Egremont. The remains will be conveyed to Holstein by G.T.R. train, and the funeral will take place there on Friday. A service will be held at the home on Fifth Avenue to-morrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. The Rev. Mr. Rodger, of Knox church, of which the deceased was a member, will conduct the service. The bereaved husband has the sympathy of the community in his sorrow.—Owen Sound Sun.

MARKET PRICES.

The other day, a citizen turned up an old diary of 1876, and found some entries of market prices in Walkerton which form a decided contrast to present prices. On December 19th, 1876, the price of hay was \$5.50 a ton. Meat by the quarter was 4 to 5 cents per lb., for the front and hind quarter respectively. Geese were 5c. per lb. dressed, and turkeys 5c. to 6c. per lb. dressed. Wood was \$2.00 per cord.—Bruce Herald.

LOST A LEG.

Samuel Robins, C.P.R. brakeman, was crushed under the car wheels in the marl yard near Maple Hill on Thursday and lost a leg as a result. Robins was standing beside the train, and just as it started, he made a kick at the air brake, which was not working properly, but unfortunately slipped and fell between the cars.
