Porter, work on bridge, lot 24, con. 5, \$1.20; Com. 3 trips to 10, con. 5, \$1.20; Com. 3 trips to 2 bridge, sideroad 5, con. 5, \$2.25; 2 trips to bridge, sideroad 10, con. 5, \$1.50, inspecting Hoffman's graveling, \$1.00, total \$4.75. Traynor, cost \$60 re McDougall's drain; clerk, \$5 on above award; Dr. Brown, disinfected dwelling, \$5; assessor, \$105; clerk's quarterly salary, \$13.75; do. postage, stationery, 6 months, \$5; Treasurer, half year salary, \$57.50; do. postage, stationery and supplies, \$6.15; reeve clerk and treasurer, financial statement, \$9.

Resolved that the financial statement as now read, be adopted, and the clerk get 200 copies printed for distribution. Philp-Roberts-That the reeve vacate the chair, and Mr. Watson occupy it.-Carried. Mr. Watson read the following address:

DROVE FOUR MILES DOWN

A marvellous trip in a cutter down the railway track, was made by a farmer en route to Markdale one evening recently. Some kind person may suggest that such a dare-devil trip would seem more appropriate had he been travelling in the opposite direction, but this man was on his way to town. At the '70 sideroad, four miles north of Markdale, he turned his horse onto the railway track, and made the four mile trip to Markdale down the C. P. K. tracks, arriving without mishap and apparently indifferent of the terrible risk he ran of coming in contact with a train en route. On the trip down, two high, single-track bridges were crossed, where a slight swerve to the right or left out of the direct course, might easily have precipitated both driver and outfit over the bridge into the deep water twenty feet or more below. Arriving at Markdale, he turned his horse up Main street, and came up town. Had he been ten minutes later he would have met the night train which arrived in Markdale a few minutes after and whose whistle in the distance was easily discernable when he switched off the track at the Main street. However there are no disastrous results of the trip to record, only "what might have been," and we would not advise anyone wishing a short cut to Markdale to come this route and run chances on arriving as safely as the lucky individual above reported.-Standard.

BY-LAW No. 582 For Establishment of Public Library A By-law to provide for the establishment of a Public Library in the Town of Durham. WHEREAS the present Library Board, and certain electors have petitioned the Council of the said Town of Durham praying for the establishment of a Public Library under the Public Libraries Act, BE IT HEREBY enacted by the said Municipal Council that 1. In case the assent of the electors is given to this By-law, a Public Library be established in this Municipality, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Libraries Act. 2. The votes of the electors shall be taken on this By-law on the 2nd day of January, 1911, commencing at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, and continuing until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, at the aforementioned places. In the North Ward, or Polling Station Number 1, at the Office of George Lamb, Deputy Returning Officer, Clifton Elvidge. In the East Ward, or Polling Sub-division Number 2, at the Town Hall, Durham, Deputy Returning Officer, W.H. Bean. In the West Ward, or Polling Sub-division Number 3, at Carson's office, Deputy Returning Officer John Smith. 3. On the 31st day of December, 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, the Mayor shall appoint, in writing, signed by him, two persons, to attend at the final summing up of the votes, by the Clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law. 4. The Clerk shall attend at the Clerk's Office in the Town of Durham, at the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on the 3rd day of January, 1911, to sum up the number of votes given respectively for or against the By-law.
