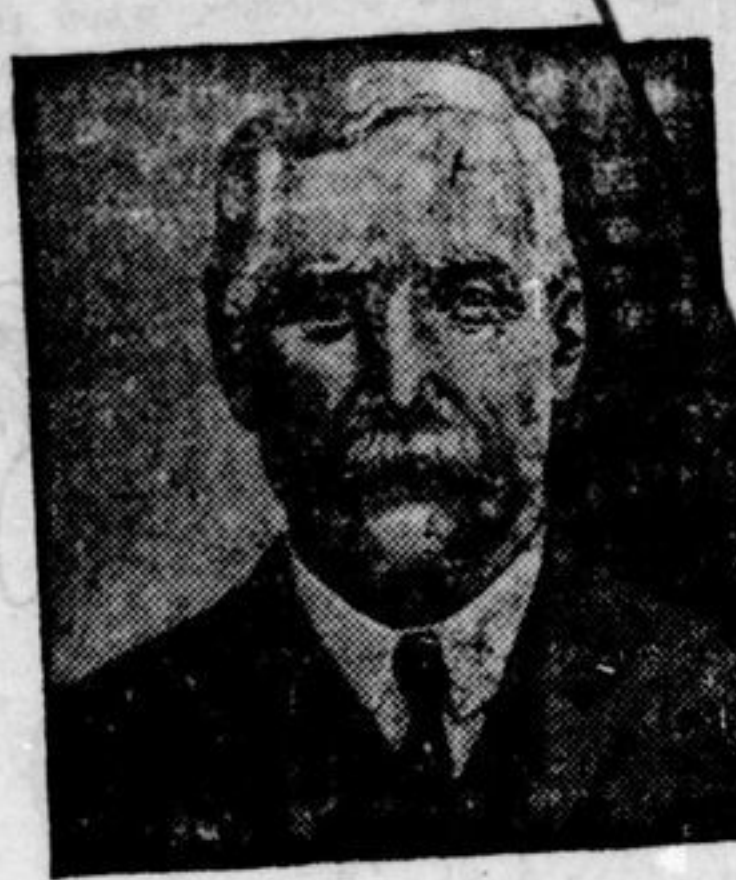

vote should have been submitted to see the effect the three years' experience under local option would have on the minds of the ratepayers. The thought should be of some value. Thought the law was fairly well observed since local option came into effect. The Municipal Ward claimed that Council might exercise their judgment on submitting a repeal By-law, but he had different opinions, as well as the opinions of the local solicitors that the submission of the By-law was imperative.

He then touched on the finances and the school, and went on to explain his usefulness to Durham as a member of the County Council, showing how the assessment of Durham was kept down, while other places were considerably increased.

Legislation regarding Continuation Schools was necessary in the interests of Durham, and the law should undergo some modification regarding the building County bridges. Thought Grandfraxa St. bridge should be regarded as a County bridge, as it was on the direct line between Owen Sound and Mt. Forest, just as the Camp Creek bridge.

Mr. Saunders criticised Mr. Calder's actions as member of the town council, and county council. Mr. Ramsay put in a plea for the support of the Library By-law which he thought should be taken over by the town, and a grant secured from Mr. Carnegie.
