DURHAMS TAKE CHESLEY'S MEASURE

Before a record house, numbering over 900 people, who jammed Durham's big skating pavilion from end to end, the fast Durham septette of hockeyists took the return game from Chesley on Tuesday evening, 4 to 1.

The gate was the largest ever taken in Durham, and for so big a crowd, was a most orderly gathering. People were here from miles around, Flesherton, Markdale, Owen Sound, Heston, Mc. Fores, Hanover, Walkerton, and other places being represented, while even the farming community for fifteen miles out, forgot their troubles, and hiked for the game. And it was some game too, and so far as we can ascertain, not one word of dissatisfaction has been expressed. Everybody got their money's worth, and returned home of the opinion that it was a whole big quarter's worth of amusement.

The fact too, that Chesley had won from the locals on Chesley ice the previous Thursday evening by a 3 to 2 score, was an indication that the play would be close, and the game a hard one, and when it was learned that they were coming by special train, the excitement became intense. Though the score was 4 to 1, it was no 4 to 1 game, as the Chesleyites made the locals step every minute, but were unable to score, owing to the magnificent work of our stonewall defense, the checking back of the forward line, and the fact that they were checked so close they could not get up close enough to the nets to shoot effectively.

The game started at 9 o'clock, and from the face-off, both teams went right after the rubber, and in two minutes, Falkingham had tallied for the locals, duplicating in thirteen minutes more, while Saunders slipped in another tally in another twelve minutes of play. This ended the scoring for this period the game at half time standing Durham 3, Chesley 0.

The second half opened with a rush, and in four minutes Falkingham again scored the last goal for the Durhams, while Chesley, with three Durham men on the fence, secured their lone tally fifteen minutes later, the full-time score standing Durham 4, Chesley 1.

The game was the best ever seen on our local ice, though the Owen Sound team, who are due here on February 14th next, will put up just as strong an argument. From start to finish there was no let-up, no hard playing, or no broken periods to speak of, the game, for so hard a one, being exceptionally free from roughness. The only accident of the game happened when, with four minutes to play Kelly, of the Chesleys, and Thomas, of the Durhams, collided, with the result that Kelly was forced to leave the ice, Thomas going off with him.

That Durham has a good team this season is now an established fact, and whether we win the district or not, or even the League Championship, the team that takes the trophy will have to step in less than three minutes. 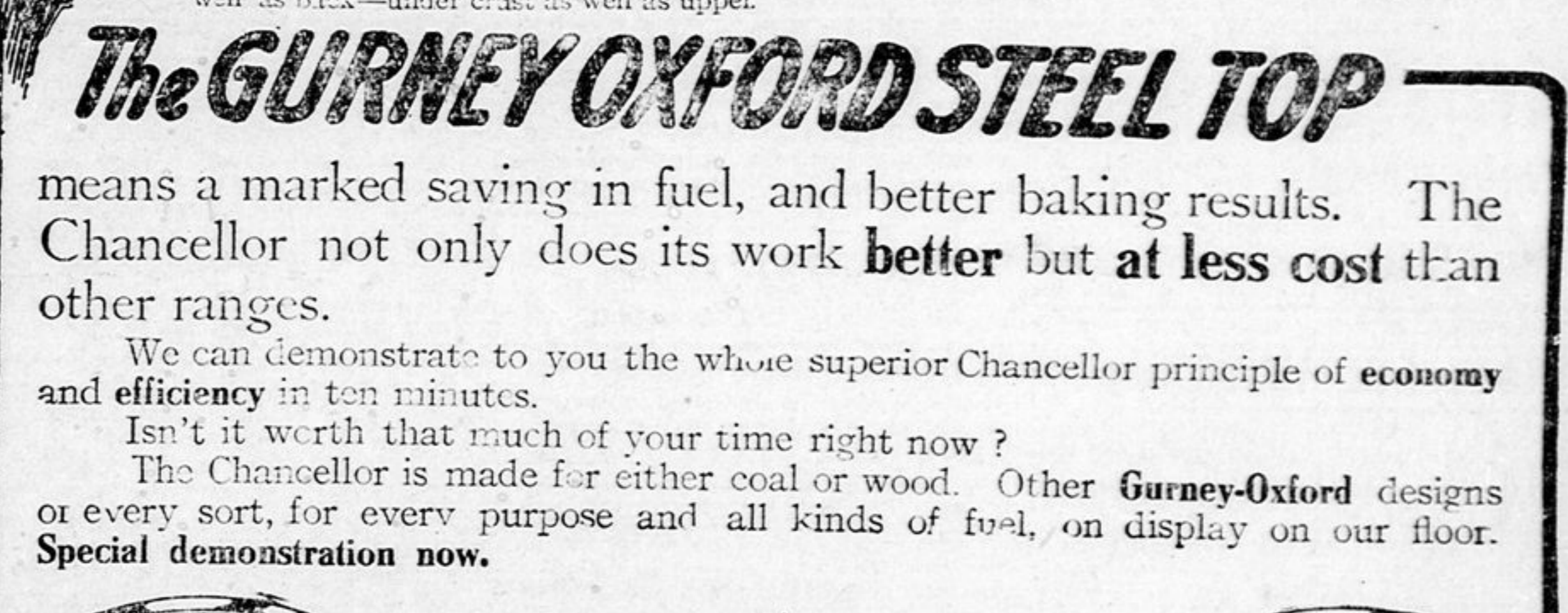
