FROM THE LAND OF THE HEATHER

During the past few weeks it has afforded me a great deal of pleasure to travel over a good deal of Burn's country; wandered through the streets that to him were so familiar and viewed the scenes that his genius has made immortal, spending two days in "Auld Ayr, wham ne'er a town surpasses"

For honest men and bonnie lasses."

The town is full of interesting memories of the poet and here is the scene of perhaps the best of his poems. Going up the High Street we pass the Wallace Tower, which then, as now, struck the hours, for

"The Drowsy Dungeon Clock had numbered two

And Wallace Tower has sworn the fad was true."

In a niche half way up the tower is a statue of Wallace. Further up the street is the Tam O' Shanter Inn, where Tam and Souter Johnnie had got planted uncouthly.

"Fast by an angle bleezing finely, We roaming swats that drank divinely."

Over the door is a large picture of Tam 'weel mounted on his grey mare, Meg,' taking leave of his friends and setting forth on his famous ride.

We take a car and follow along the three mile road to Alloway. It is daylight and calm and witches are not abroad. The road is beautiful. We pass thro' the trees to catch a glimpse of Alloway's auld haunted Kirk. We alight and as we enter we pass the grave of the poet's father and on the stone is the epitaph written by his famous son. The old Kirk is in ruins, nothing left but the walls and the bell still hanging in the belfry on the gable. The old walls are generously covered with ivy, as if kind nature endeavored to beautify the famous spot and to keep green the memory of the poet who so lovingly sang her beauties. We walked around the old building and looked in at the window and tried to imagine the scene, The Curious Tam, The fearsome Sights, The startled witches and the mad race to the keystone o' the brig when

"Ae' spring brought of her master hale, But left behing her ain grey tail."

We pulled a sprig of ivy and passed on to the monument, a beautiful structure on the flowing bank o' Doon, erected by Scotchmen the world over to the memory of their own loved poet. The surroundings are beautiful, the grounds with tree and shrub and flower are well kept, sloping gently down to Doon.

We climb the stairway and from the top we view the landscape, hill and dale, field and woods and Bonnie Doon winding its way to the sea. No wonder the poet was inspired to sing the "Banks and Braes o' Bonnie Doon. We descend view the relics, inscribe our name in the visitors' book and return to the cottage where Burns was born. It is an old one-storey building thatched with straw and kept in very good repair. What memories cling around that "auld clay biggin." How is it hallowed by events of the past, a shrine at which worship pilgrims from every land. But "nae man can tether time or tide." The car is here. Good-bye Alloway.

We return to Ayr and as we enter the town we notice the fine statue of Burns standing in a square at the head of High Street. This is said by the people of Ayr to be the best statue of Burns in existence, but the statement is disputed by Kilmarnock. On the pedestal are scenes taken from Tam O' Shanter and The Cottar's Saturday Night. The statue is facing Alloway, looking out upon the landscape so familiar and towards the home he loved so well and that tuned his music to sing her tenderest note of domestic love and felicity.

But would the scene be so familiar? Doubtless he would know the old cottage where he was born on that day "oor monarch's hui-most year but ane." Perhaps he would recognize the more prominent features of the landscape. But looking from the lofty pedestal does he see the changes that have taken place? Does he see his native Alloway with its fine modern buildings, its magnificent grounds, its new kirk, its teagardens, the new brig that spans the Doon, and the most imposing of all, and overlooking all that beautiful tribute to his memory? Does he hear the push of the railway train as it sweeps through the home of his childhood and the haunts of maturer years? Does he see an admiring

world carried past on electric wings to render homage to his memory? Can he see all this? Can he remember the past? He, the lowly peasant, the humble plowman the constant companion of hardship and care, battling with poverty, neglected by nearly all, despised by many and perhaps hated by a few. And now! The world is at his feet. Wherever the English language is spoken and beyond, his name is a household word and his songs an inspiration.

But 'twas ever thus. The ordinary mortal, his vision downward, muckraking in the dust, sees not the upward glow of the rising sun nor the golden gleams of light pointing to higher and better things. Not till the full sunburst of glory breaks upon his clouded sight, can he discern its splendor or recognize its source. Then perhaps he is willing to worship, willing perhaps to make amends for his past neglect, often alas, too late.

The auld brig is an object of intense interest. I made several visits to it. It has been put into a good state of repair and is quite possible it may outlast the present bridge there. Well on towards midnight I stood on the centre arch and with Burns heard the whistling wings and listened to the warring 'spirits that o'er the brigs of Ayr preside,' hurling at each other their epithets of 'Auld Vandal,' and 'conceited gowk.' And then the Genius of the stream appears, followed by his fairy train of all that is lovely and peaceful. To my mind the latter part of the poem, this vision is one of the finest bits of poetry produced by Burns's genius.

Kilmarnock too is full of relics and memories of Burns. There too is a very fine monument with a statue of the poet. It is situated in a very commanding position just outside the town in a very nice park. It looks down on the site of Tam Samson's curling rink where

"He was King o' a' the core, To guard or draw or wick a bore Or up the rink like Jehu roar In time o' need"

There are Samsons yet in Kilmarnock, said to be lineal descendants of the famous Tam. I paid my twopence and entered the sacred shrine. There is much to interest, a lock of bonnie Jean's hair, her wedding ring, several belongings of Burns himself, many of his original letters, a volume of the first published edition of his poems printed in Kilmarnock and what to me was of greatest interest the original manuscript of Tam O' Shanter. There it is, written in a bold clear hand. To-day just as clear and legible as when it was traced by the hand of Burns. The changes from the original draft are few and are interlined or written on the margin.

All these things take us back to the time when Burns, Bonnie Jean, Tam O'Shanter lived and acted their part in the drama of life, and Burns, little as he thought it at the time, was making history for Scotland, lifting her poetry to a higher plane, a plane that has not yet been surpassed and making himself and his character as immortal as the name of Scotland.

There are other places connected with the life and poetry of Burns that are of much interest such as Dumfries. But time and opportunity have not yet allowed me to visit them. I may see some of them before my return.

KING GEORGE CORONATION FUND

A committee has been formed in England to receive subscriptions from all the "Georges" of the Empire for the purpose of giving a Coronation gift to His Majesty King George. It has been suggested by His Excellency the Governor-General, who has been in communication with the committee in England, that steps be taken in the Province of Ontario to receive subscriptions to this fund ranging from five cents to five dollars. The names of the subscribers will be published and a list sent to the King, but the amount of the donations will not be shown on the list.

The City Treasurer of Toronto has been appointed Treasurer for Ontario of the fund, and all subscriptions will, ultimately be forwarded by him to the Bank of Montreal, at Ottawa, to be in turn transmitted to the proper authorities in England. It has also been arranged that all branches of the chartered banks will receive subscriptions and forward same to City Treasurer not later than April 30th, 1911, after which no subscriptions will be received.

The Committee trust that the matter may be taken up enthusiastically.

It is quite important that in making this circular public, special care should be drawn to the fact that subscriptions should only be payable to the Banks or different Local Treasurers wherever duly appointed, or to the City Treasurer of Toronto, the object being to warn intending subscribers against persons who may assume to have authority to collect with a view to diverting collections to their own use.
