The Council met April 8th, pursuant to adjournment, all the members present, the Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: Reeve of Holland re town line deviation, R. T. Edwards on School matters Ontario Sewer-pipe Co. Price list. W. R. Thompson re Smellies Crossing, Jas. P. Hare with By-Law on deviation, Wood Gundy and Company re debentures, C. Ramage and Son balance on Printing account. W. B. Volt re re-appointment of Continuation School Trustee, D. Jamieson M. P. re Township bridges, J. Kelly quarterly return, showing T. p. money in Bank last day of March at \$2415.71, By-Law No. 519 appointing Neil McCann as Continuation School Trustee was introduced and read a first and second time.

McMillan-McNally, that this Council are unanimously agreed to purchase the Road (33 feet wide) on lot 28 con. 15 for the sum of \$100 from John McArthur on the west side of said lot from the gravel road to the C. P. R. right of way and that Reeve Clark and M. McMillan be instructed to carry out the deal as soon as all parties are satisfied, providing that the C. P. R. Company build a station as has been suggested to the members of the Council.—Carried.

Firth-McMillan—That By-Law No. 519, filled up with name of Neil McCann be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-Law Book.—Carried.

McNally-Firth—That the Clerk be instructed to order Vault door from Goldie and McCulloch to be delivered at the Town Hall.—Carried.

McNally-Weir—That the following persons be appointed sheep inspectors for division 1 John Moffat, for div. 2 M. McInnis, for div. 3 Samuel Wright for div. 4 Colin McArthur, for div. 5 James Nelson.—Carried.

McNally-McMillan—That C. Ramage of the Review be paid \$24.55 balance of printing account for 1910.—Carried.

McNally-McMillan—That Alex. Crauston be paid \$3.50 for attendance on Morley family and that Wm. Baker be paid \$2.70 for attendance on Mrs. McArthur's family, while these families were quarantined for Scarlet fever.—Carried.

Firth-McMillan—That the Treasurer be paid \$2.15 for supplies, Postage and Registration.—Carried.

McMillan-Firth—That members of the local Board of Health be paid as follows: E. W. Hunt \$2.00, R. J. Torry \$2.00, A. McLachlin \$2.00, J. S. Black \$2.00, Geo. E. Peart \$4.00, Total \$12.00.—Carried.

Firth-Weir—That Joseph Schmitzler be paid \$48.00 being full amount for cedar timber for floating Bridge at lot 90 con. 3 S. W. T. and S. R.—Carried.

Firth-McNally—That Wm. Paylor be paid \$5.00 for plough broken while ploughing roads in winter the Plow being almost new was entirely broken up.—Carried.

McNally-Firth—That James Ledingham be paid \$1.35 for 27 loads of gravel put on road.—Carried.

McNally-Weir—That Chas. Vaughn be paid \$2.00, conveying Andrew Kelly to House of Refuge.—Carried.

McNally-McMillan—That Joseph Firth be paid 50 cents for selling timber on Road Allowance at Lot 26 con. 3 E. G. R.—Carried.
