lands seemed to be rocky and hilly, scarcely mountainous, and the shore line indented with numerous bays and inlets. But we drew away from the land and in a few hours we had our last glimpse of the Emerald Isle, and turned our faces towards the west, where to some of us, at least, lies our home, and the prospective home of all the rest.

All day Monday and Tuesday, the weather was calm, and the sea smooth, not by any means still. The Atlantic is never still. But our vessel was gently rocked by the long, low swell, that rolled along from the West. The air was mild, and the sun shining clear, everybody was astir, and becoming acquainted with each other. Games of all kinds were started, inside were cards, draughts, chess, etc., outside the deck steward was initiating the sport inclined to various games. The most popular was deck curling, which was played by both male and female whenever the weather was fine during the voyage. There was also ring the hoop, rope quoits, and even cricket and golf.

On Tuesday night, everything indicated a change. The barometer was falling rapidly, the wind began to rise, and the sky was lowering. On Wednesday, the wind blew a heavy storm and the big vessel tumbled and tossed over the huge waves in a manner that would make a green landsman somewhat nervous, sometimes falling into the trough of the sea, and sometimes with her bow in the air, riding over the crest of a mountain wave. This was kept up all day, and into the night, and had a very unpleasant effect upon ninety-five per cent. of the sixteen hundred odd passengers on board. Not more than three per cent. appeared at the tables, although judging by apparent circumstances, one would have expected them to be at least hungry.

On Thursday evening, the gale had somewhat abated, but all day the long heavy rollers of the Atlantic kept our vessel in active motion, and not until night did the sea become comparatively smooth and many of the passengers began to appear ready for their meals.

The captain took a very southerly course, much below the latitude of Halifax, in order to escape ice and fog. But on Friday night we ran into a bank of fog. The steamer slowed down, and the fog whistle blew at intervals of two minutes, much to the annoyance of passengers below trying to sleep.

The passengers? Yes, from the first saloon to the lowest of the five decks, they were a fine, pleasant, intelligent lot of people, all socially inclined, they mingled freely together, and seemed to enjoy themselves thoroughly, and

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took philosophically any unpleasant incidents in connection with the voyage.

Saturday morning we were fairly through the fog, and the good ship sped rapidly on her way, the sea being fairly calm, and the log recorded a good run for the day. On Friday evening, there were two concerts in the steerage dining rooms and to-night, one in the first and second cabins. The entrance money was a shilling, and a collection besides.

Quite a sum of money was realized, which went to the support of the Sailors' Orphans' Home, in Glasgow, a very worthy object; and nobody begrudged their contribution. I can only speak of the very fine concert of music, speech and elocution. It fell to my lot to propose a vote of thanks to Captain Main, the officers and crew of the ship, for their courtesy, kindness and attention to the passengers under their care. The resolution was carried with hearty cheers and musical honors.

Sunday morning dawned threateningly, and in a few hours snow began to fall, and our emigrants were welcomed to Canada by a regular North-west blizzard. They did not seem to appreciate it very much. We were running at half speed, and soon stopped altogether, and all night long we were lulled to sleep by the two minute blast of the fog siren, and the dash of the waves against the side of the ship.

Monday morning, the storm had abated, yet the wind was high and cold; we were soon steaming slowly toward the harbor, with land full in view on either side. An ocean liner was seen away off on our beam, which was soon ascertained to be the Canada, of the White Star Line, and had left Liverpool a day before us. Our boat was soon plunging through the water at full speed, in a neck and neck race for the harbor. We slowly forged ahead, reached the pilot station first, and won the first berth at the wharf. Soon we were steaming up the calm waters of the land-locked harbor of Halifax. The vessel was docked, and under a clear sky, and brilliant sunshine, we stepped out onto Canadian soil, and home.

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HOME

We sailed from Glasgow on April 1st. on the Allan Line steamship Hesperian. The weather was fine, clear and cool, as if it endeavored to leave the best possible impression of Scotland on the minds of the hundreds of her sturdy sons and winsome daughters leaving her shore. To try their fortunes in another land.

The lines were thrown off, and the big steamer left the dock in tow of a diminutive tug boat amid the good-bye greetings and the strains of Auld Lang Syne, sung by the people on the boat, and their hundreds of friends on shore in unison. Followed closely by the steamship Saturnian, of the Donaldson Line, we dropped slowly down the Clyde, round her many windings, past Dumbarton Castle, a spot that has seen stirring times in Scotland's struggle for independence. Down past the miles of shipbuilding yards to Greenock, where we stopped, and many more passengers came aboard, and many friends who had come down thus far to bid their loved ones farewell, went ashore.

We sailed on past the tail of the Bank, turned south down the Firth in perfectly smooth water, gliding past Holy Island and the hills of Arran on one side, and the shores of Ayrshire and Kircudbright on the other. We passed close to Ailsa Craig as the shades of evening fell and most of the passengers remained on deck as long as the Scottish shores could be discerned through the darkness.

It was rather a thoughtful time. The great majority were leaving their native land for the first time parting with their friends and all the associations of home and early years, venturing out into a new and unknown land, to make a home for themselves, and perhaps for others whom they have left behind. And all of us bid Scotland good-bye, perhaps never to see her shores again. Is it any wonder that silence for a time was felt in the crowds that lined the railings. But we all at last retired for the night, lulled to sleep by the throb of the engines and the wash of water on the sides of the boat as she ploughs the water, bound not for Canada, but down the Firth to Liverpool.

On Sunday morning, we find ourselves going up the Mersey in a dense fog. Steering slowly, our ship just missed running on a sandbank, escaped collision with another steamer by a narrow margin, and as the fog lifts, reaches the landing stage at Liverpool. Another batch of emigrants came aboard, and at noon we left, steaming gently down the river, out into the Irish Sea, and at last had a fair start on our voyage to Canada. Our course lay along the south of Ireland, and before we retired we could see the lights along the coast, but could learn nothing of the appearance of the land, nor of the places along the shore.

The next morning we were still in sight of land, along the south-west coast of Ireland. The coast
