GLENELG COUNCIL.

The council met May 8th pursuant to adjournment, all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

By-law No. 520, appointing sheep valuers was introduced and read a first and second time, and filled up with the names of John Moffat, Malcolm McInnes, S.H. Wright, Colin McArthur and Jas. Nelson, and passed.

Mr. Jos. Firth was instructed to have vault built in the hall, and that he be paid \$2 per day while superintending the same, and the clerk was instructed to have plan of the same prepared.

Weir-McNally—That the reeve be instructed to pay the balance due on bridge at lot 56, con. 3, E. G.R., namely \$400, when passed as completed by the engineers.—Car.

McNally-Weir—That the Commissioners for the several wards be allowed \$200 each as ward appropriation for 1911.—Carried.

Weir-McNally—That this council pay sheep inspectors \$1 for each trip of five hours or less, and issuing certificates, and that the clerk provide them with printed forms for use as certificates.—Car.

Firth-McMillan—That this council as a whole be a committee to inspect deviation between Holland and Glenelg, to ascertain the best method of a settlement regarding the same.—Carried.

The council adjourned to June 3rd, at 10 a.m.
