The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia, met in the town-hall, Flesherton, on Saturday the sixth day of May, 1911. The members were all present, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The following communications and accounts were presented and read: Dr. J. W. S. McCullough asking the council to send delegates to the meeting of the Canadian Association for the prevention of tuberculosis at London, on 7th inst., from the office Specialty Co., re cabinet; from John I. Graham, asking to be relieved as road overseer; W. C. White, account for gravel; J. J. Martin, certifying that Thomas Phillips had performed his statute labor for 1910.

Mr. Caswell—A. D. McLeod—That councillor D. McLeod is hereby appointed to have the road grader put in order and to procure such repairs therefore as are necessary.—Carried.  
McKenzie—A. D. McLeod—That Chas. McCutcheon, be paid \$1.25 for gravel supplied by him.—Carried.  
A. D. McLeod—Mr. Caswell—That the tender of C. McLean to operate the road grader for the season of 1911 at \$2.00 per day, be accepted.—Carried.  
McKenzie—Caswell—That the first meeting of the Court of Revision of the assessment of 1911, be held on Saturday, the third day of June 1911, at 11 o'clock a. m. and the clerk publish the required notice thereof.—Carried.  
Council adjourned.

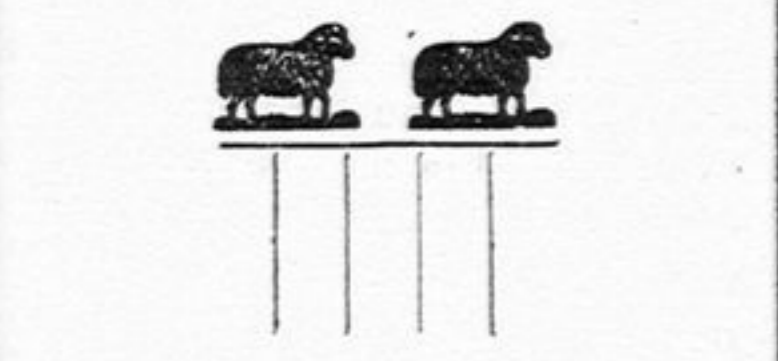
