Liquor licenses may now be granted by the provincial authorities in Cochrane, Ont., without objection from the Dominion Government. An Order-in-Council, which appears in the Canada Gazette exempts this municipality from the operation of the act forbidding the sale of liquors within ten miles of the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway.

With the approach of hot weather, it is very probable that the Provincial Board of Health will again order that all dogs in the province be muzzled during the summer months.
