THEIR APPEAL THEN AND NOW

In a recent issue, reference was made to the attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his successful effort to rush through the building of the new transcontinental railway.

Mr. Fielding was equally anxious about the transcontinental. He said: "It is desirable that we should give our American brethren to understand that Canada is resolved to work out her own independence in these things."

He said further: "To make the principle secure, the following clauses were embodied in the Agreement with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, and confirmed by Parliament: 'It is hereby declared and agreed between the parties to this agreement that the aid herein provided for is granted by the Government of Canada for the express purpose of encouraging the transportation of goods through Canadian channels.'

When it was discovered that the Premier was in trouble in England owing to the fact that he did not understand the effect of the reciprocity agreement, and could not explain its terms, and when it was learned that he had cabled for Mr. Fielding to come over and help him, there was the usual chorus of official denial and expostulation.

The Company further agrees that it shall not in any matter within its power, directly or indirectly advise or encourage the transportation of such freight by routes other than those above provided, but shall in all respects in good faith, use its utmost endeavors to fulfil the conditions upon which public aid is granted, namely—the development of trade through Canadian channels and Canadian ocean ports.

The reciprocity agreement practically forces the Grand Trunk to disregard the spirit of the agreement if the agreement ever becomes effective. To protect and preserve themselves, they will be forced to build roads, or require lines and connections to the south, so as to share in the inevitable north and south trade.

Similarly, the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian Northern must build or acquire new lines and connections to the south. The transcontinental railways will be detrimentally affected by the introduction of the reciprocity agreement. It seems impossible that it should be otherwise.

OUR OTTAWA LETTER

Mr. F.D. Monk, the Nationalist-Conservative member for Jacques Cartier, has made his position clear at a meeting in Montreal. He denounced the ministry for arranging reciprocity through a series of clandestine meetings, and declared that the adoption of the reciprocity policy was a tactical error, inasmuch as the Democrats were about to come into power in the United States, and all the privileges which Canada was now obtaining at a cost would later have been granted to the country freely.

As to annexation, Mr. Monk declared the Nationalists held to the Canadian ideal with maintenance of autonomy. "We wish to remain in the Empire, and fulfil our duties in this connection," he declared, "without abandoning one iota of our rights, or impeding our legitimate expansion."

As to his own position, he said: Newspapers which derive large profits from the public chest, and many others which are the outcome of a corrupt administration are anxious to know if I am still a Conservative. In the face of the questions we have referred to, the status of this or that individual should not be a matter of great interest for the electors who are called upon to decide these questions. I learned my political catechism at the feet of George Etienne Cartier, who loved his country, and served it faithfully to the end. I am not aware that I have wandered from the traditions inherited from this great patriot.

Certainly the political situation in Canada has seldom been so disturbed as it is at present. To begin with, no Canadian Premier has ever been so criticized in England as has Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the occasion of his present visit. The British press has discovered the suave Canadian Premier, and the name which one newspaper has given him, "Mr. Facing-both ways," will stick to him as long as he lives.

That the Government has prepared its plans for a sudden appeal to the people, shows that anything may be expected at any moment. The Voters' Lists are now being printed at the Government Printing Bureau. Men are working night and day, and the lists will be ready in two months.

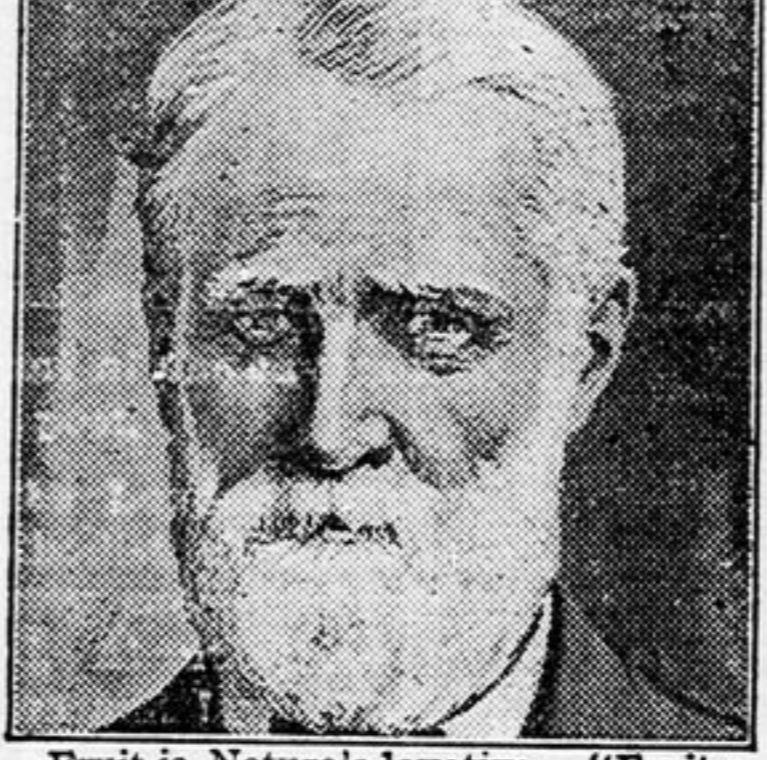
