PRICES IN THE STATES

Consumable Commodities That Have Dropped in Price Since April, 1910

There has been a decided recession in the various markets for consumable commodities in the United States since a year ago, when the great body of consumers in different parts of the republic protested against the high cost of living in the form of anti-meat-eating leagues and by many petitions to the Government at Washington. The Pioneer Press, of St. Paul, Minnesota, recently published the following table which shows prices of various commodities in April, 1910, and April, 1911:
