### EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met June 26th, minutes adopted. Communications received: From Royal Grafton, re steel beams for Holstein bridge. Beams are 8 in number, 39 feet long, 15 inches deep, weight 42 lbs. per foot. At 2c. per lb., cost \$262.08. Beams received examined and approved.

Roberts—McRobb—That foregoing bill of costs be paid.—Carried.

From D. Allan jr., sheep inspector for Division No. 3, reported that Mr. S. Neil alleged that he had a lamb killed by dogs, and required inspection, which was done. Report was given in detain. Time occupied by inspector, half a day.

Roberts—McLachlan—That when dog tax is collected, Mr. Neil will be notified to appear before the council in reference to the matter and inspector to be paid \$1.50 when tax is collected.—Carried.

Philp—Roberts—That the reeve and comr. McLachlan be appointed to examine the bridges in the south of the township, and see what timber is required to put them in a safe condition, and report.—Carried.

Roberts—McLachlan—That comr. Philp be instructed to take an inventory of tile on hand, and instruct Mr. Robb on sizes required and see about the timber for Holstein bridge.—Carried.

Philp—McLachlan—That comr. Roberts be instructed to notify the comr. of Normanby to meet him at Dodds' bridge, Orchardville, to consider the expediency of making a road through the river for traction engines, thus avoiding the bridge.—Carried.

### ROAD REPORTS.

Comr. McLachlan reported; Wm. Aldcorn put a new covering and two new stringers in culvert, lot 7 con. 6, cost \$3, and John Durrant pathmaster, travelling by day's labor in division 10, con. 2-3, amounting to \$25.60. There were 44 loads gravel put on by said work, and 14 loads by statute labor. Gravel obtained from Geo. Hunt cost \$2.90 and \$1.00 allowed for damage to crop.

McRobb—Roberts—That foregoing report be adopted, and comr. be paid 50c. com. fees.—Carried.

Com. Roberts reported Wm. Pinder, travelling by day's labor, \$10 John Eurig, \$63.15, John Swanson \$26. Wm. Aberdem, operating grader 2 1/2 days, \$7.50, A. McCaw, two men and team half day, \$2.25, drawing tile for culvert, \$1.50, Peter Mutch, travelling by day's labor \$18.00.

Philp—McRobb—That above report be adopted, and comr. paid \$3 com. fees.—Carried.

Roberts—McLachlan—That S. E. Smith be paid \$13.75 for operating grader 5 1/2 days.—Carried.

Philp—McRobb—That S. Robb be paid \$12 for tile making, and \$3 for drawing cement.—Carried.

Sundry accounts amounting to \$212.59 were paid.

McLachlan—McRobb—That we now adjourn, to meet on Monday, July 24th.—Carried.
