The cement works at Shelburne had a narrow escape from fire on Tuesday, the work company's fire brigade saved the plant from total destruction.

He possesses a rich tenor voice, and sings with a clearness and distinctness rarely found among singers. At present, the students are conducting meetings with the Baptist church at Ailsa Craig. Immediately at the close of that campaign, they will come to Durham. Everybody is cordially invited to the services. The singing and speaking will interest you and the meetings will make you think.
