FLESHERTON.

Another of the few remaining settlers in Artemesia has passed away in the person of Mrs. Sarah Badgerow, relict of the late Mr. Samuel Badgerow, who died at her old home on the 4th line, on Thursday afternoon last, aged 75 years. The funeral took place to Flesherton cemetery on Saturday afternoon, and was largely attended. In religion, the deceased was a Baptist, and her pastor, Rev. J. H. Kelly, conducted the funeral service. The deceased, whose maiden name was Sarah Ferrer, was born in Markham township, where, 55 years ago, she was married to Mr. Badgerow, who predeceased her 14 years ago. After marriage, she came with her husband to this township, and settled on the 4th line, where she has since lived, respected in the community, and beloved by her large family of sons and daughters, who survive her as follows: David, Meron and Anson, in Michigan; Lafayette, near Portlaw; Joseph, Saugeen Junction; Gordon, Toronto; Herbert, Durham; Mrs. John Nuhn and Mrs. J. Colgan, Flesherton; Mrs. Joseph Croft, 4th line, Osprey; Mrs. Robt McIntyre, near Portlaw; Mrs. David Kirby and Mrs. Fred Sims, Toronto. All but the sons in Michigan were present at the funeral.

Mr. Geo. Gordon, a highly respected old resident near Eugenia, died on Monday of last week from the effects of a cup of gasoiline, drunk in mistake for water.
