### CHILD RUN OVER BY TRAIN.

The Monday evening train on the L.H.&B. ran over Willie Marshall, the six-year-old child of Mr. Frank Marshall, sectionman, at Hensall.

The accident, which happened a mile north of Hensall, was discovered by a passenger who happened to be looking out of the rear window, and saw the poor little fellow lying by the side of the track. The alarm rope is alleged to have been pulled, but owing to some misunderstanding the train was not brought to a stop until Kippen Station was reached. The train was then backed down, and the little chap picked up, when it was found that one leg had been severed from the body close to the hip, and the toes on the other foot cut off. The train was backed into Hensall, and then pushed through to Clinton on all possible speed, and the child taken to the hospital, where he received every attention, but the injuries were of so severe a nature that it was impossible to save his life, and he died last night.

It appears that he had walked up the track to meet his father returning from work, when the most unfortunate accident occurred.—Clinton News-Record.

### THE LATE A. J. MCARTHUR, M. P. P.

Calgary papers made many references to the death of this former Saugeen and Paisley resident whose death occurred in that city early in the morning of Monday June 5th, after an illness of ten days from pneumonia. During the latter part of the previous week Mr. McArthur's condition showed distinct signs of improvement, but on the night of June 4th, he began to sink fast, and before midnight it was plainly seen that the end was near. At the time of his death, Mrs. McArthur, their two little boys, his brother, John P. and three of his sisters were present, in addition to the doctors, and one of the clergymen of the Baptist church, Mrs. McInnis, who left Paisley on the Wednesday before, arrived there on Sunday evening.

The late Mr. McArthur was born on the Island of Iona, Argyshire, Scotland, in 1857. He was a son of the late Peter McArthur, of Saugeen, who in 1851 secured a tract of 500 acres of land on the townline of Saugeen and Bruce and brought his family out here from Scotland in 1859. The subject of this notice was then only about two years old. His education was acquired by attendance at the home rural school and at Paisley school. He early showed a business trend, and became engaged in stock buying, and shipping from this section.

His first acquaintance with the west was on a trip to Calgary in 1889. It was not long before he had acquired interests and business connections which linked his future life with Calgary and Alberta. The possibilities of the ranching business demanded good stock from the east, and Mr. McArthur began shipping in pure bred animals for sale, and also established herds of his own on lands acquired. Later he entered the real estate business in Calgary, and met with the greatest good fortune in his investments. He had become one of the best known and most popular men in Central Alberta.

His high standing as a citizen and his success in business brought him honors of a public character. In October of last year he was elected a member of the Alberta Legislature by the constituency of Gleichen, as a Liberal and supporter of Premier Sifton. While yet standing on the threshold of a useful public career, he was called upon to pass beyond the activities of earthly life.

Mr. McArthur was also honorary president of the Liberal Association of Alberta, a deacon in the first Baptist church, and a member of the board of directors of the Y.M.C.A.

The funeral took place on Wednesday last from the family residence in Crescent Heights, to the Union Cemetery. The Alberta Provincial Government was to be represented at the obsequies by Hon. C.R. Mitchell, attorney-general, Hon. Duncan Marshall, acting premier, and Hon. J.A. McLean, provincial secretary, also a large number of members of the provincial assembly.

The deceased is survived by his widow and two young sons, Peter Donald, and Archibald Alexander, one brother, John P. McArthur, of Calgary; and four sisters, Mrs. McInnis, of Paisley; Miss C.S. McArthur, and Mrs. Lynes, of Innisfail, Alta.; and Miss Mary McArthur, of Paisley. The bereaved ones have the sincere sympathy of their host of friends in the old home sections of Bruce-Paisley Advocate.

Mr. McArthur was a cousin of the McArthur families in the "Glen," Glenelg, and also of Mrs. Neil McCannel, of this place.—Ed. Chronicle.
