FARM LABORERS' EXCURSION

This year's wheat crop, according to a conservative estimate, will be two hundred million bushels, and the Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan governments advise that fifty thousand men will be required. The majority of these will have to be recruited from Ontario, and the Canadian Pacific Railway are running excursions to Winnipeg and West at \$10. Free tickets will be supplied at Winnipeg to destinations in Western Canada east of Moosejaw Saskatoon and branches. Special through trains to Winnipeg will be run by the C. P. R., the only through line, on the following dates:

- Aug. 12, from all points in Ontario north of the G. T. R. main line Toronto to Sarnia, which includes all branches of the Toronto-Sudbury line.
Aug. 16, from points in Eastern Ontario
Aug. 23, from all points west of Toronto in Ontario.
Aug. 25, from all points East of Toronto in Ontario and Quebec.
Through trains will be run from Ontario points on the above dates to Winnipeg, avoiding all transfer or customs troubles en route. Ask any C. P.
