McWILLIAMSVILLE.

On Wednesday, August 23rd, there passed away at his home in North Egremont, another of the few remaining good old pioneers, who were left to relate the incidents and hardships of pioneer life, the subject of our sketch being Mr. John McKenzie. About a year ago, he first began to complain of feeling unwell, and two or three months more passed away, and his illness developed into severe, and at the end, fatal stomach trouble, which his rugged constitution, medical aid, and kindest of friends could not allay, or drive away. It was in February last that the deceased first took to his bed, never to rise in health or strength again, and as the few months passed away, the once strong and stalwart frame, that never knew sickness or ill health, gradually failed and wasted away, but all with the greatest of patience and Christian observance, though his suffering was great, he bore it all in silence, and was never known to murmur. The subject of this sketch was born in Ross-shire, Scotland in 1842, and was therefore sixty-nine years and five months old at the time of his death. At the age of sixteen, he emigrated with his parents to this country, and settled for a time at Zora, and subsequently moved, with oxen and jumper, to North Egremont, and settled on lot 10, concession 19, which lot he held at the time of his death, with clear title, and was classed among the best farms in the township, with comfortable surroundings. We now go back to the time when he first settled in Egremont, making his first trip, as we have already stated, by oxen and jumper through bush, and bog holes, over hills and through valleys, sometimes getting stuck, and feeling somewhat discouraged, but he had within him one of those brave young hearts that fought their way through the woods. He was L.O. of the chicken hearted type of manhood that exist to-day. Trains and locomotives, horses and highways, were almost unknown in those days, and we oft-times heard him relate of the carriages used in those days, which were either a jumper, or a wagon, with the wheels cut from the end of a large log.

The funeral, which took place on Friday last at Amos church burying ground, was very largely attended by friends and relatives, the solemn and impressive service being delivered by his pastor, Rev. Geo. Kendall, who made many kind references to the qualities of the deceased. The floral tributes were handsome, a wreath from the family being beautiful, and of new design. Among others was one from Mr. and Mrs. Ben E. Woods and a pillow from Mr. and Mrs. Ben McKenzie, and flowers from Mr. and Mrs. R. Gregor. The faithful partner of his joys and sorrows through years of toil and industry still survives him, seven of a family blessed their union, as follows; Aggie, Mrs. R. Gregor, Mt. Forest; Lizzie, Mrs. J. Eccles, Dromore; James, near Yeovil; Mary, Mrs. Ben E. Woods, of Bowmanville; Maggie, Mrs. G. A. Watson, McWilliams; and Jennie, Mrs. J. Long, Thistle; and John, on the old homestead.
