ONE YEAR'S TRIAL

Edward Blake has declared in no uncertain way.

OUR REAL KING

We do not refer to our beloved Sovereign, but to young Mr. King, of the Liberal party, who recently declared before a German audience at Berlin that the Naval policy of the Conservatives meant furnishing battleships to be used by England against Germany.

The King we refer to is one who through all his career appears to have fed at the public trough, one who appears to have never cast other than a straight party vote in his life, one who appears by his speech at Berlin to be desirous of stirring up race feeling and hatred.

A STRONG PLEA FOR CANADIAN FISCAL INDEPENDENCE

Mr. W. F. Maclean, Editor of the Toronto World, shows by good Sound Reasoning that Reciprocity is not to the Interest of Canada as a Nation.

On Thursday night of last week, a meeting of South Grey electors met in the town hall to listen to an address on Reciprocity, by Mr. W. F. Maclean, of the Toronto World, in the interest of Mr. R. J. Ball's candidature.

Mr. Wm. Laidlaw was voted to the chair, and in his opening remarks upheld the National Policy in operation since 1879, as the Policy under which the Dominion had made rapid progress, and was still in a more healthy condition than any other country. The reciprocity trade policy now advocated by the Liberals was the very opposite in character, and he did not think that a similar continued progress could exist as did by the policy under which the governments operated for the last thirty years.

Mr. Wm. Allan, of Egremont, was the next speaker. He said he came to hear Mr. Maclean, and did not expect to be called on for an address. He rejoiced, however, to know, that no country to-day enjoyed greater prosperity than Canada, and thought it would be a dangerous move to do anything to disturb the prosperous conditions we now enjoy.

Mr. Wm. Calder spoke on behalf of Mr. Miller. On taking the platform he expressed his pleasure in having the privilege of doing so. He disagreed with the remarks of Mr. Allan as to the difference between the reciprocity agreement and the National Policy. He said we had good times during the time we had reciprocity from 1854 to 1866. It was the fault of the United States that the then reciprocal trade relations were brought to a termination.

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The present duty on cement is 43c. a barrel; by the agreement it will be reduced to 38c., only a comparatively small reduction he claimed, and would not affect the industry.

Dr. Jamieson, on rising, said the whole question seems to be reciprocity, which showed good political tactics inasmuch as the new subject absorbs others, and overshadows the misdeeds of the late Government. He agreed with other speakers that the National Policy was the great cause of our national prosperity.

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The five cents per barrel tariff reduction would be sufficient to put our cement mills out of business. They are not making profits now. On a 250,000 barrel a year mill, such as ours, 5c. a barrel would mean \$12,500 a year, and enough to cause it to suspend operations.

Mr. W. F. Maclean, who came in the G.T.R., arrived as Mr. Calder was closing his address, and was accorded a most rousing reception. He was the next speaker. On rising he referred to an article
