THE REVIEW SAYS "VOTE FOR MILLER AND THE GOVERNMENT"

Local Liberal Organ Dodges the Issue and Tries to Secure Miller's Election on Personal Grounds

LETS RECIPROCITY STRICTLY ALONE

Practically Admits the Agreement a Bad One for Canada and Says the Question Should Never Have Been in Politics

LAST week's Review says: "Before another issue of the Review reaches most of our readers, the great issue will be decided. The South Grey voter in the booth has two things to consider: First—Shall he or shall he not vote to turn out Miller, by all odds, and by general admission, the best member South Grey ever had, and in fact one of the best members that sits at Ottawa. He has brains, and has used them; he has influence, and its results are seen; he has represented Conservatives as well as Liberals; his character is unimpeachable; he is an ideally competent man for the position.

Second—Shall he vote for or against the Government? A Government that has given the country a measure that was received with almost unanimous acclaim when first presented till the evil gains of partyism saw a chance to make fit a battle ground. By almost common consent, it is admitted the question should never have been in politics. Mr. Borden is the first Conservative leader that ever opposed reciprocity and will certainly be the last. The record of the Government in its immigration policy its conservation policy and in its financing of post office and all public business has been a remarkable one. Every year except the first a surplus, and big ones at that, Canada has prospered as never before. Why not support them in this latest measure that the States came seeking, and more than met us half way.

Miller and more markets on local and national grounds should have the hearty support of every man in South Grey, who recognizes merit in a man or enterprise and progressiveness in a Government."

From a perusal of the above, we are of the opinion, more than ever, that the Review, in supporting Mr. Miller, has done so for the simple reason that he is Mr. Miller, and a representative of the Liberal Government. In the whole campaign, the Review has been content to sing the praises of the Laurier Government and Mr. Miller and the Government, and to stay as far away as possible from the issue.—Reciprocity. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has said all along that Reciprocity was the issue, and the one question on which the Government was to stand, or to fall, according to the wishes of the majority of the people. This being the case, all other questions sink out of sight, and whether Mr. Miller has made a good or a bad representative, whether the Government has been a good one or a bad one, this is not to be considered, for, according to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.—Reciprocity is the issue which is to be voted on this Thursday. In the face of this, there remains but one of two things to do. The Liberal Government is supporting Reciprocity. If it is returned to power, Reciprocity we will have. Mr. Miller is a supporter of the Government,—always was, and always will be, it makes no difference what party introduces Reciprocity. Reciprocity would be just the same under one government as the other. If it is a bad thing for Canada, the fact that it is a Liberal measure will not better it. And in this election, it is a Liberal measure, and the electors have been, in no uncertain terms continually reminded of this, and also that if they want Reciprocity, they MUST vote for the Liberal candidate, and if they do not want Reciprocity, they MUST vote for the Conservative candidate. Hence, it easily follows that SOUTH GREY ELECTORS WHO ARE OPPOSED TO RECIPROCITY, MUST VOTE FOR MR. BALL.

Recognizing this, the campaign conducted by the Chronicle has been carried on entirely along the lines of Reciprocity, and believing the Agreement to be detrimental to the farmer, and the laboring man, and to the progress of Canada as a nation, we have endeavored to present, fairly and honestly, the facts as they appeared to us, backing up our statements with Government figures and statistics.

We have not conducted a campaign for Mr. Ball, the Conservative candidate, simply on the grounds that he is running on the Conservative ticket, but rather on the grounds that he is supporting a ticket that is in favor of Canadians developing their own resources, and not turning over our timber limits, and other natural products to the United States, for their exploitation and ultimate benefit.

The Review regrets that Reciprocity has been made a political issue. And why? Surely not because it has disrupted the ranks of the Conservative party, and caused them to desert their party by the wholesale, thus ensuring the return of the Liberal Government. No, the reason the Review has such sincere regrets is more to be found in the fact that this question of Reciprocity has worked such havoc in the ranks of the Liberals in South Grey, and throughout the length and breadth of Canada, that the situation has become a serious one to them, and if the job were to be done over again, they wouldn't touch Reciprocity with a ten foot pole.

Farmers, artisans, and manufacturers realize that they are treading on dangerous ground, and that the passing of the Agreement may put an end to the good times that have been enjoyed by the whole Dominion, practically ever since the National Policy went into force. The National Policy made good times for Canada when we were going backwards; we have had good times ever since: and the chances are that a continuation of the National Policy will give us good times for years to come. The farmers, artisans, and manufacturers will hesitate before they kill "the goose that laid the golden egg."

The Review again gets away from the issue.—Reciprocity—when it solicits support for the Government on the grounds of its immigration policy, its conservation policy, and its financing of all public
