**EGREMONT COUNCIL.**  
Council met Sept. 18th. Minutes adopted. Communications from G. Smith, sheep inspector, re two sheep killed by dogs, belonging to H. Hoffman, and one killed and another badly worried, belonging to Jas. O'Farrell. Report adopted and owners be paid according to valuation, as soon as fund is collected, and inspector be paid 75c. and \$1.20 respectively for his services.—Carried.

From John Isles re damage to engine by breaking through a bridge.

Philp—McLachlin.—That reeve settle with Mr. Isles respecting said damages.—Carried.

The directors of the Egremont Agricultural Society waited on the council soliciting a grant.

McLachlin—McRobb—That a grant of \$15 be made.

Mr. Wm. Allan addressed the council asking a grant to erect a snow fence at lot 15, con. 3.

McRobb—McLachlin—As commissioners' appropriation is all expended, cannot entertain it this year.—Carried.

Roberts—McLachlin.—That Rhoda Way be exempt from land tax for 1911.—Carried.

Road reports were all given in detail, and were of a general nature, which showed that comr. McLachlin had expended in his division \$67, and work on Dreury's bridge, \$24.38. Com. fees, \$2.

Com. Philp spent in his division \$34.93, and paid \$4.15 into treasury, price of lumber and nails sold to S. Stewart, left from building fence in 1910. Com. fees, \$3.

Com. McRobb spent \$234.75 including a new bridge at \$72.00. Com. fees, \$3.

Com. Roberts' report showed \$292.12 spent in his division. A large amount of his was for new bridges, material, etc. Fees, \$4.

The reeve's account of work and inspecting bridges and water courses showed two days, Holstein bridge, \$5; eight at Dreury's, \$20; meeting reeves of Arthur and Luther re water courses, \$2; posting notices and letting jobs on town line Egremont and Proton, \$2. The reeve's report was adopted.

By-laws No. 257 to appoint an assessor, and 258 to levy the rates received the usual readings, and were passed.

W.A. Reeves was appointed assessor salary \$140, and is required to begin his labors by Oct. 1st.

Rates are higher this year by reason of large increase in county rate and an additional amount of bridge work this season.

Sundry accounts amounting to \$248.99 were paid.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday Nov. 13th, for general business.
