INTERESTING FACTS

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS. Thos. E. Fitzgerald, of Peterboro, is dead, aged 78.

Three provincial bye elections will be held in Nova Scotia, November 15th.

Those who dodge the poll tax in Beauford will, if caught, be fined \$5.

The Nova Scotia Conservatives' banquet to R. L. Borden will take place November 2.

Montreal's assessor thinks the city has 25,000 more than the census allows.

The G. T. R. is buying up property in Hamilton supposed for a new station.

Joseph Marcotte, a brakeman, was killed at Verdun, Quebec, when he missed his footing.

The C. P. R. will spend \$5,000,000 in hotel extension and rebuilding throughout Canada.

Dr. Clapp, of Mildmay, will be the Conservative candidate for the Legislature in South Bruce.

A Galt syndicate has bought 120 acres of land, and will donate 40 acres to manufacturers.

Fred. Carbeau, aged 25, Ottawa, was killed by the collapse of a roof on which he was standing.

The body of John Connolly, a well-known Bridgeburg man, was found in the M. C. R. yards there.

John Robitaille, a young Canadian Pacific brakeman was cut in two while switching at Coleridge, Manitoba.

Hon. Sidney Fisher will likely return to Parliament, the seat of Sheffield, Quebec, having been offered him.

Peter Elson, M. P., for Middlesex, East, denies that he was offered a senatorship to retire in favor of W. T. White.

Mayor Guerin, of Montreal, laid the corner stone of the new Herald building, at Craig and Alexander streets.

Footprints leading from the burned barn to his home led to the arrest of Varman Vandenberg, for incendiarism near St. Catharines.

Albert O'Brien, manager of the Immigration Department dining room at Halifax, has been dismissed, and Geo. J. Poley, a Conservative, appointed.

The schooner Renown, owned by A. E. Crosby, ex-M.P., of Halifax, bound from Spain to Newfoundland with onions, sank in mid-ocean and the crew were rescued.

Humphrey Wood, aged 75 years, an inmate of the county's House of Refuge, Cobourg, committed suicide by hanging. He was at one time a prosperous farmer, but too many lawsuits ruined him.

The survey of the boundary between the northern possessions of the United States and Canada, is costing the two governments jointly about \$2,000,000. The work has been going on for the past fourteen years, but will be completed probably next year.

The seventh World's S. S. Convention will be held in Zurich, Switzerland, July 8-16, 1913.

A balloon was blown out to sea from Dieppe, France, but the three passengers were rescued.

The Nobel prize in medicine has been awarded to Prof. Allvar Gullstrand of the Faculty of Medicine of Upsala University, Upsala, Sweden.
