Durham, 1st December, 1911. To the Editor of the Representative;—

Dear Sir,—My attention has been called to an article in your issue of this week dealing with the reference I made to your statement that 25 men in convention brought out Mr. Wm. Calder as a candidate. That article contains an insinuation that compels me to ask space for a reply. The article furnishes additional evidence that your sources of information are defective. Your editorial sagacity in the first instance should have led you to doubt that in a close riding such as South Grey, only 25 people would attend a convention, your editorial courtesy in the second instance might well have restrained your pen in part.

You say "if all we hear is true, the amount of pap Mr. Miller obtained for the pet editor of his riding was pretty considerable even to the extent of that enjoyable editorial trip to 'auld Scotland.'" Now, Mr. Editor, we are not thin-skinned, but it is not fair fighting to "mention"—which is to insinuate—that our trip was a government favor. Neither Mr. Miller nor the government contributed one cent to that trip, nor furnished favors of any kind, were not asked to, were not expected to, and it is surprising how any such absurd idea could be entertained, but the Rep. says "something we have heard."

Again, whatever of government pap came our way (and it was in many cases less than independent journals received) full value was given therefor. Its coming did not elate us or make us rich, its going does not depress us, nor cause us to "become soured." The merits of an election, as far as we are concerned, depend on other issues than whether we do, or do not receive government favors: if this be the view the Rep. takes of an election, we must offer it congratulations on getting on the winning side.

We have read our little item again, and fail to see where the "abuse" comes in, or the "hysterics," but are sure your readers will find the latter commodity a-plenty in your editorial.
