POULTRY SHOW A GREAT SUCCESS
The Durham Poultry Association held their second annual exhibition in the town hall here on January 17th and 18th. The show was a great success, and there were 500 birds on exhibition, and Mr. A.W. Wakeford, of Listowel, placed the awards where they belonged. The general quality of the birds was good, and keen competition in some varieties, especially the black, buff, and white Orpingtons, White Leghorns, Plymouth Rocks, Minorcas, Rhode Island Reds, White Wyandottes, Brown Leghorns, Brahmans and Games. Some birds changed hands at fancy prices. A plucking contest took place on Thursday night, and was a great attraction. Mr. Chas. O'Near winning the prize. The Association wish to thank the citizens who donated so freely, and also the town council, for their liberal grant. The exhibition proved great progress over last year, there being more birds and better quality. Nearly four hundred people visited the show.

An interesting feature in connection with the show was an address delivered by Mr. A. J. Harris, of Burks Falls. The address was not only interesting, but profitable, to all poultry raisers, who could read, learn and inwardly digest what he had to say. He divided his subject into the following topics:

Use of poultry, Enormity of the industry, Cleanliness, Breeds, Housing, Feed, Show room, Egg production, Markets, Conditioning the birds for shows, etc., etc.
A fair-sized audience listened to what he had to say, and no doubt many of the poultry fanciers received valuable hints from his remarks.
The judge, Mr. A. W. Wakeford, of Listowel, was highly pleased with the fine exhibit, and expressed his opinion that the birds would be creditable in the larger exhibitions. The Society, too, express themselves as highly satisfied with his services, even those who were beaten on close margins having no complaints.
Mr. Thomas Cowan sold three birds, Black Orpingtons, for the handsome sum of thirty-five dollars. The judge was the buyer, and he did no dicker over the deal.
